# Northern Peru 11<sup>th</sup> July- 5<sup>th</sup> August 2003

## Introduction

This trip was arranged through Kolibri Expeditions (<a href="www.kolibriexpeditions.com">www.kolibriexpeditions.com</a>) run by Gunnar Enblom, while the itinerary was made by me (Samuel) who initiated the whole thing. From the very beginning, this was supposed to have been a private tour with a rented vehicle and four participants. However, I was interested in a pelagic trip from Lima and in visiting Nuevo Salem, a newly discovered site for Orange-throated Tanager, so I contacted Gunnar who of course offered himself to arrange the whole trip. This would not have happened had he not given us a teasing special prize. Whether his intention from the beginning or not, Gunnar after a while asked of the possibility to include one or two more participants. I was a bit sceptical about this, but finally agreed. In the end we were suddenly eight participants plus a trainee guide; the original four of us – Samuel, Daniel, Benny and Antonio; Peter, Bert and Carl from Holland, Roger from Sweden and Mauricio from Arequipa. To our aid (except for the first two days) we had the skilled driver Luis Adriano.

The trip was a success as far as birds are concerned. We would not have done as good if I had followed the original plan and just rented a car on our own. From a different point of view it can also be called an interesting study in social group dynamics. I'm thankful that no major conflict broke lose during our 25 days together, because there were some tensions caused by multiple reasons. As a "semileader" of the group it sometimes felt a bit difficult trying to hold everything together. It has to be said that many of the tensions directly or indirectly were caused by Gunnar, not least by giving us an antique van that was too small to our big group. Having said this, I must also say that most of the time things worked quite OK. Mauricio did a fine job with many practical and lingual issues, for which I'm grateful, and without Adriano we might have dropped down a mountain wall or got stuck for ever in a muddy hole between Bagua Chica and Imazita... We had many funny moments together, and our small hardships forged us to a functional group despite our differences.

What all of us will remember is the great adventure (it really was at times!) and the many phenomenal birds we saw. Seing a displaying male Marvelous Spatuletail was the absolute highlight for me, something I've been dreaming of since I was a child. To be a part of the discovery of Kalinowski's Tinamou was a once in a life time experience, that's for sure, which of course also is true for our finding of a nest of Royal Sunangel. The 633 species seen by the group was a very good result. Gems like Long-whiskered Owlet, Tumbes Tyrant, Marañón Crescent-chest, Ash-throated Antwren and Ochre-fronted Antpitta have to await discovery until next time...

# **Summary of the journey**

11/7 Late arrival in Lima from Seattle via Houston.

12/7 Resting day in Lima.

**13/7** Callao pelagic trip.

**14/7** Transport to Trujillo. Birding confined to a few hours at Lomas de Lachay and roadside stops, mostly in the vicinity of Casma.

15/7 Early start from Trujillo. Late morning at Rafán. PM at Bosque Pomac. Night in Olmos.

16/7 Quebrada Limón and road towards El Tocto. Night in Olmos.

17/7 Abra Porculla all morning. Afternoon at Chamaya. Night in Jaen.

**18/7** Early morning 8 km north of Jaen. Late morning and afternoon around Tamborapa. Night in Bagua Chica.

19/7 Mainly a transport day. We finally reach Imazita after nightfall, on foot!

20/7 Nuevo Salem.

21/7 Nuevo Salem.

**22/7** Morning at Nuevo Salem. Afternoon birding along the road between Imazita and Chiriaco. Night in Chiriaco.

**23/7** Morning mainly spent birding along the road back to Bagua Chica. Afternoon spent driving. We finally end up at Pedro Ruiz around 21.00.

**24/7** Marvelous Spatuletail feast in early morning. From late morning on birding at Abra Patricia. Threats of a Sendero Luminoso general strike force us back to Pomacochas.

25/7 Río Chido trail. Night in Pomacochas.

**26/7** Abra Patricia/Afluentes/Aguas Verdes. Night in Aguas Verdes.

27/7 Aguas Verdes/Afluentes/Abra Patricia. Night in Aguas Verdes.

28/7 Abra Patricia all morning. We end up in Chachapoyas in the late afternoon.

**29/7** Morning stop north of Tingo. Abra Barro Negro area from late morning to afternoon. We arrive in Balsas at dusk.

**30/7** Early morning near Balsas. Late morning at Hacienda Limón. Most of afternoon spent in Celendín, but short birding trip in the evening west of town.

**31/7** Most of the day spent birding along the road between Celendín and Cajamarca. Late afternoon in the Río Chonta Valley. Night in Cajamarca.

1/8 Transport day. Night in Chimbote.

**2/8** Mainly a transport day up the Río Santa valley and Cañon de Pato. Late afternoon birding in Huascarán NP.

3/8 Most of the day spent birding in Huascarán NP. Night in Recuay.

**4/8** Transport between Recuay and San Damian with birding stops. Afternoon at San Damian. Night in Huarmey.

5/8 Morning birding at Puerto Huarmey. Back in Lima at 17.00, where we part.

**6/8** Samuel, Daniel and Benny arrive in Newark at 06.30. Six hours spent on Manhattan. Flight home leaves in the evening.

7/8 Home in Sweden again.

## Logistics

As we had a professional driver who knew both the car and our route, we could relax most of the time concerning those matters. The van did cause us trouble, though, which actually slowed us down quite a bit the last two weeks, but Adriano knew how to handle it. Birding on public transport is difficult or impossible, and time consuming (I tried it in 1999), so a car is more or less essential to make a successful trip. But if you do it on your own you should be

very well prepared. Prior arrangements have to be made to visit Nuevo Salem, and that's also recommended for Quebrada Limón.

No accommodation was prebooked. We usually chose a budget alternative, or made it a budget alternative through our skilled chief negotiator Antonio. Simple to middle class hotels are found more or less near all major birding sites. At Abra Patricia and Aguas Verdes it is possible to sleep on the floor of restaurants if you ask – we spent 2 nights in that way at Aguas Verdes. Likewise, getting a cooked meal every day is usually no problem.

## **Site notes**

I didn't take any site notes in the field. If I had, this section could have been more detailed. However, good site information for north Peruvian birding localities is rather hard to find, so I hope that the information given here to some degree will contribute to improvement of the situation.

## Callao pelagic

Kolibri Expeditions arrange pelagic trips on a regular basis. The price, 135 dollars, is certainly on the expensive side, but it's about the only easy way to get to the upwelling zone along the Peruvian coast. The boat used on our trip was pretty small and the waves a bit higher than usual, so it didn't feel comfortable at all when we went out on the open sea. At least it took a long time before I got sea sick, and it wasn't that bad. Nevertheless, the trip was successful, although we didn't get any surprise bird. Highlights were Hornby's Storm-Petrel, 3 species of Albatross, Cape Petrel and 2 Blue Whales! Almost anything could turn up.

## Lomas de Lachay

Lomas de Lachay was the first site we birded. Lack of time combined with bad luck forced us to leave the place with far less species than we had hoped for. The entrance road held impressing numbers of Least Seedsnipe (wonderful display!) and Grassland Yellow-Finches, as well as a single Short-eared Owl and Cinereous Harrier. We had a very possible Thick-billed Miner in traditional rocky loma vegetation, but little else of greater interest.

No less than 45 Peruvian Thick-knees were found a few kilometers south of the turn-off to Lomas de Lachay near a major crossroad. We drove 1-2 kilometers east from the junction, and there they were. We only found Coastal Miners here, though Grayish Miner should be present too. Cactus Canastero is found on nearby slopes to the north, but we didn't manage to find a suitable road to take us there.

#### Rafán

Rafan, a small village in the middle of the coastal desert, is a traditional site for Peruvian Plantcutter and Rufous Flycatcher. It is easy to get here. First, go to Mocupe Nuevo, which is 30 kilometers south of Chiclayo on the Panamericana. Here you turn westwards on a sandy road (ask for directions), and after 10 kilometers you reach Rafán. You can also take a bus to Mocupe Nuevo and a shared taxi from here to Rafán (1 sol in 1999). Search the acacia woods on both sides of the road just east of the village. Except for the two specialities, regular species include Scrub Nightjar, Peruvian Martin (although I've only seen Gray-breasted

Martins here), Collared Antshrike, Gray-and-white and Tumbesian Tyrannulets, Superciliated Wren, Cinereous Finch (common) and Sulphur-throated Finch. Fields in the area might hold Least Seedsnipe and Tawny-throated Dotterel.

## **Bosque Pomac**

From the park HQ, follow the straight dirt road that leads into the forest. Where the road bends to the left, continue straight ahead on a small trail and after 30 meters you'll come to a river that is more or less dry much of the year. Black-faced Ibis has been found here, as well as Tumbes Swallow. Rufous Flycatcher and Peruvian Plantcutter can be found anywhere in the mature acacia wood. We only spent a few afternoon hours here, but it still felt quite birdy.

If you ask for permission you may be able to drive along the dirt road to look for Tumbes Swallow. After several kilometers you reach a kind of dam construction and concrete-lined ditches to your right. Here we saw 4 Tumbes Swallows along with numerous Blue-and-white and Southern Rough-winged Swallows. If you continue along the dirt road (ask for directions) you'll end up at the Chiclayo-Olmos road.

## Quebrada Limón

A site that is a bit tricky to visit on your own. You need a 4WD, and it seems easy to get lost among the maze of tracks leading through flat areas of acacia scrub and dry riverbeds. It takes 2-3 hours to get to Limón from Olmos. To be in the quebrada early in the morning you'll have to camp there. We were not aware of this. Adriano said it would take about 50 minutes to get there, but it took us almost 3 hours (including a food shopping stop). Fortunately it didn't take long to find our guide, but when we finally reached the quebrada it was already 09.30. The White-winged Guans (6 pairs in the area) are easy to see before 8 o'clock as they move in the lower parts of the canyons, but later on they get difficult to detect. We had to work quite hard for our birds, but finally all got good views of a pair.

Tumbes Tyrant and Tumbes Hummingbird are strong possibilities in the acacia scrub between the old Panamericana and the quebrada. We hardly did any birding here, but we did find two Tumbes Sparrows. Similar habitat is found along the road towards El Tocto a bit to the north, where we birded in the late afternoon. Here we also had some Tumbes Sparrows but failed to find the other wanted Tumbes specialities of the area. It actually looked better along the road to Quebrada Limón.

#### Abra Porculla

Almost no forest is left on the west slope of the Andes along the Olmos-Porculla road, only in the steepest ravines. We didn't stop here at all, wanting to spend our time near the Porculla pass, where some reasonably good forest is still found. It was quite windy during our visit, so it was a bit difficult to bird properly. Hummingbirds were numerous, especially Spot-throated Hummingbird, but several Gray-chinned Hermits and Green-tailed Trainbearers were also seen. Black-crested Tit-Tyrant and Chestnut-crowned Antpitta were other highlights, while we failed to find the real specialities Rufous-necked Foliage-gleaner, Piura Chat-Tyrant and Bay-crowned Brush-Finch. We followed an obvious dirt road going northwestwards with patches of forest in between pastures and cropland. After a while we tried the opposite side of the valley, where the forest patches actually looked better and we had more shelter from the wind. Here we caught a brief glimpse of a possible Piura Chat-Tyrant.

#### Chamaya

Chamaya is a small village on the main road between Chiclayo and Bagua Grande. The Jaen junction is in the middle of the village, the town itself 16 kilometers away. Along the Jaen road there is good scrub and some riparian forest. The main attraction here is the Little Inca-Finch, but there are several other Marañón endemics around. About 1-2 kilometers from Chamaya there is a good area with dry and riparian scrub. Little Inca-Finch should be found with little to moderate effort in the dry scrub. Peruvian Pigeon and Drab Seedeater both seem regular, while common species include Striped Cuckoo, Spot-throated Hummingbird, Marañón Gnatcatcher, Marañón Thornbird, Collared Antshrike, Sooty-crowned Flycatcher, Purple-throated Euphonia and Red Pileated-Finch. There are many hotels in Jaen. The best way to get to Chamaya early in the morning if travelling by public transport is to take a shared taxi (ask where they go from).

## **Tamborapa**

Tamborapa is a village c. 40 kilometers north of Jaen. In the middle of the village there is a police checkpoint where you need to register to continue. Just after the police station there is an intersection. If you take the right fork you will find a scrub-covered slope after 200 meters. This is apparently a good spot for Marañón Crescent-chest. We birded here for a while, but the only bird of greater interest was a Marañón Thrush seen by two in the group. If you continue 8 kilometers along this road you'll get to a site for Marañón Spinetail mentioned in *Cotinga*. Our intention was to go to this site, but we only had the GPS coordinates and thought that we should take the main road towards the Ecuadorian border. So, eight kilometers north of Tamborapa along the main road, we discovered that we were on the wrong side of the river! Nevertheless, the habitat here looked promising. Roadside birding, a short side trail overlooking the river and (best of all) a trail leading into the forest gave the hoped for Marañón Spinetail (without playback!), Buff-bellied Tanager, Northern Slaty-Antshrike, Marañón Wren, Drab Seedeater and Lesser Goldfinch.

Another good birding area is found west of Tamborapa along the road to Tabaconas. We didn't have any details of this area, though Adriano said that was the place to go. Military Macaw is supposed to be easy, otherwise the species are about the same. Other possibilities in the general area include Tataupa Tinamou, Slaty (rare) and Yellow-cheeked Becards, Black-capped Sparrow (possible split) and Gray-breasted Flycatcher.

## Bagua Chica-Imazita road

This amazingly rough road (c. 70 kilometers) pass through foothill and lowland rainforest (which, unfortunately, seems to get rapidly cleared near the road), and is still pioneer country. Security is a bit problematic in the area. Bandits are said to frequent the road, and we had to bring an armed policeman with us for the journey. The whole trip, including the stay at Nuevo Salem, was a real adventure!

The best remaining forest along the road is found several hours from Bagua Chica. The road traverses a low mountain range with a pass situated at around 800 m. Just before the pass the forest is rather OK. We had Wire-crested Thorntail, Amethyst Woodstar and Pygmy Antwren here. Beyond the pass the forest is largely undisturbed for a while. Here we found good mixed species flocks containing such rarities as Straw-backed Tanager and Fiery-throated Fruiteater, while more ordinary species included Black-faced and Yellow-bellied Dacnis, Opal-rumped,

Opal-crowned, Paradise and Yellow-bellied Tanagers, Spangled Cotinga, Lemon-throated Barbet, Golden-headed Manakin, Moustached Antwren and Double-toothed Kite. We weren't able to spend enough time in the area, and interesting discoveries surely await.

The stretch between Chiriaco and Imazita held good roadside birding, with species like Many-spotted Hummingbird, Sand-colored Nighthawk (on sandy islands in the Río Marañón), Golden-collared Toucanet, Ivory-billed Aracari, Scaly-breasted Woodpecker and Yellow-browed Tody-Flycatcher seen in a few hours. Ecuadorian Cacique should be looked for – it's supposed to be fairly common beyond Imazita along the road towards Peña Blanca.

WARNING! The Aguarunas at Peña Blanca and beyond are hostile. Although no of the few birders that have entered the area in the past have had any trouble (that I know of), they have been playing a risky game - several tourists have been killed. Do not go there unless the situation improves. Orange-throated Tanager is easily seen at Nuevo Salem, and it is now possible to arrange a mini expedition to Santiago-Comaina Reserved Zone to see the newly rediscovered White-masked Antbird. Arrangements to visit the area have to be made through Gunnar Engblom or Barry Walker (Manu Expeditions).

#### Nuevo Salem

Only a few groups of birders have visited this Aguaruna community near Imazita. Orange-throated Tanager is the main attraction here, and it seems more or less secure – a real stunner! The community has put a big faith in their newly started ecotourism project, and I encourage people to go there. Not only are there great birds, you also get the rare opportunity to experience life in a native Amazon village. Food and lodging is simple, but that only adds to the adventure! Arrangements to visit Nuevo Salem have to be made through Gunnar Engblom or Barry Walker (Manu Expeditions).

We stayed about 48 hours in Nuevo Salem and spent most of the time birding the main trail that goes up into the foothills. It is here, in the vicinity of a clearing, that the tanagers are usually found, as well as Blackish Pewee. We also investigated a few side trails, and the last morning we walked a bit along the Marañón river. Among the other birds we found can be mentioned White Hawk, Chestnut-headed Crake, Blackish Nightjar, Pale-rumped Swift, Sapphire-spangled Emerald, Olive-spotted Hummingbird, Lemon-throated Barbet, Lineated Woodcreeper, White-shouldered and Spot-backed Antbirds, Double-banded Pygmy-Tyrant, Dusky-chested Flycatcher, Wire-tailed Manakin, White-browed Purpletuft and Spangled Cotinga. Much remains to be discovered, especially at higher elevations.

#### Pomacochas/Río Chido

The small town of Pomacochas is easily reached by car or bus from Bagua Grande or Pedro Ruiz in the Utcubamba valley. The main attraction here is the absolutely fabulous Marvelous Spatuletail, which is rather easily seen with the help of a guide. Two young boys living near Río Chido (c. 1 km towards town), Edilberto Bustamante and his friend Santos, can actually show a lek on private land near the river. We got Santos as our guide, and 10 minutes later we could watch the unbelievable display of 2 adult male Spatuletails! A juvenile male and a female made short appearances. This was the highlight of the trip for most of us, and certainly for me! The males are lekking until 8, so you need to be there rather early in the morning. Spatuletails can be found with luck anywhere in the area, but adult males are pretty scarce. The lowest part of the Río Chido trail and roadside scrub, especially towards Pedro Ruiz, are

the best bets. In 1999, I found a female in town, at a water treatment plant. Just opposite the police station, take the trail 50 meters uphill, turn to the left and there you are.

The Río Chido trail is 5 kilometers from Pomacochas towards Pedro Ruiz. It starts on the left side of the bridge crossing the river. The forest in the lower parts has been much degraded, but still many birds hang around. We found goodies as White-capped Tanager and Graybreasted Mountain-Toucan, as well as spectacular numbers of hummingbirds; Long-tailed Sylph, Sword-billed Hummingbird, Emerald-bellied Puffleg, Chestnut-breasted Coronet, Collared Inca, Rufous-capped Thornbill and White-bellied Woodstar were some of the species seen. Other possibilities include Rusty-tinged and Pale-billed Antpittas (not uncommon by voice during the right season, obviously not in July), Chestnut-crested Cotinga, Inca Flycatcher and Straw-backed Tanager.

Above the village of San Lorenzo there is good forest and páramo, but it might take hours to get there. Species like Coppery Metaltail, Neblina Tapaculo and Rufous-browed Hemispingus are strong possibilities. We almost made it to the edge of the continuous forest. Ask for directions in the village if you want to explore the area.

## **Abra Patricia-Aguas Verdes**

A truly amazing birding road! I had planned for us to bird here five full days, but we had to cut off one day because the schedule was a bit too tight, and then Sendero Luminoso threatened with repercussions to anyone who would not obey their general strike on the 25<sup>th</sup> July. That day was spent walking the Río Chido trail instead, which wasn't bad at all. Left, though, were only three days plus one morning to explore the area.

The kilometer posts totally confused us the first day. The pass itself is situated at kilometer post 365, *not* 375 as described by Hornbuckle in Cotinga 12. However, the kilometer posts later make a jump from 370 to 381, so in a way it seems to be correct.

The ridge trail at the pass was only passable for about 300 meters and was very quiet. A Rusty-tinged Antpitta sang sporadically (taped in by the Dutch and Antonio, which took half an hour), but little else was heard. A couple of flocks held Slaty Finch and Yellow-scarfed Tanager, otherwise we found few species of greater interest. Others have been more lucky; Chestnut and Pale-billed Antpittas, Lulu's and Black-throated Tody-Tyrants, Red-headed Tanager and Hooded Tinamou have all been seen here.

The area around km posts 369-370 had huge flocks, containing Inca Flycatcher, White-collared Jay, Yellow-scarfed and Grass-green Tanagers, Yellow-whiskered Bush-Tanager, Hooded Mountain-Tanager, Black-capped and Oleaginous Hemispinguses and Strong-billed Woodcreeper. In the classic ridge-top area between km 383-385 we eventually found several of our best birds; Bar-winged Wood-Wren, Lulu's Tody-Tyrant, Royal Sunangel (including the first nest ever to be discovered, under a rocky outcrop), Speckle-chested Piculet, Tricolored Brush-Finch and Yellow-throated Tanager. To walk on the Owlet ridge was a great feeling, though chances of finding skulking rarities on this overgrown trail are small. We couldn't hear anything reminding of Cinnamon-breasted Tody-Tyrant in the area.

Perhaps one of the least birded parts of Abra Patricia is the sharp hairpin bends between km 386 and 389. We walked here in one late afternoon and recorded Vermilion Tanager, Greenfronted Lancebill, Long-tailed Antbird, Golden-winged Manakin, Chestnut-breasted Wren

and both saw and heard what probably was a *Dysithamnus* Antvireo. In 2001, an LSU expedition found a *Dysithamnus* which apparently is a new subspecies of Bicolored Antvireo. White-streaked Antvireo has also been reported, and what we glimpsed was likely a male of that species.

The LSU expedition in 2001 investigated "Cerro Patricia", reached by a trail leading southwards near a lonely house at km post 389. We didn't have time to try this trail, but it's surely worth exploring. The Long-whiskered Owlet was finally rediscovered here, with 4 birds mist-netted but none seen in the field. Amazingly, a recording was made from inside a tent when an Owlet was kept there overnight! Its voice is a single, grumpy hoot, and the recording is available at <a href="www.museum.lsu.edu/lane/DFLresearch1.html">www.museum.lsu.edu/lane/DFLresearch1.html</a>. About 9 Ochrefronted Antpittas were captured or observed in the field, and tape recordings were made also of this species. A few birding groups saw the antpitta in 2003.

The Afluentes area has apparently undergone some rapid forest clearance in the last few years. The best remaining forest was found between km 400 and 402. Birding here was highly productive. Some of our highlights were Blue-fronted Lancebill, Wire-crested Thorntail, Versicolored Barbet, Black-mandibled Toucan, Rufous-rumped Antwren, Chestnut-crested Cotinga (at 1430 m!), Scarlet-breasted Fruiteater, Andean Cock-of-the Rock and Graymantled Wren.

Aguas Verdes was very rich in birds and butterflies. We stayed in the restaurant by the bridge at km 409. From here a male Lyre-tailed Nightjar could be heard and seen (very hard to spot, since it did only fly around when it was pretty dark) and a pair of Band-bellied Owls were heard as well. We had great flocks towards Aguas Verdes village, containing species like Speckle-chested Piculet, Rufous-tailed Foliage-gleaner, Ecuadorian Tyrannulet, Huallaga and Yellow-crested Tanagers and Blue-naped Chlorophonia. From the bridge, Andean Cock-of-the-rock was easily seen, and various tanagers could be comfortably viewed from above. The trail going upstream on the restaurant side of the bridge gave such excellent species as Buff-tailed Sicklebill, Short-tailed Antthrush (seen well!) and Scaled Fruiteater.

## Tingo, Utcubamba valley

A roadside stop by the Utcubamba River 5-10 kilometers north of Tingo, between Chachapoyas and Leimebamba, produced several exciting species. Riparian vegetation, adjacent fields and slopes held Plumbeous Rail, Mitred Parakeet (race *alticola*, which is likely to be split; see species list), White-bellied Hummingbird, Purple-collared Woodstar, Marañón Thrush, Black-lored Yellowthroat (race *peruviana*, also a possible split) and Golden-rumped Euphonia. Fasciated Tiger-Heron can be seen anywhere along the Utcubamba river.

## Abra Barro Negro

Remnant forest patches above Leimebamba are known to be reliable for the scarce Russet-mantled Softtail. We arrived here in the late morning, the sun was shining and bird activity was thus limited. A possible Softtail was seen by Bert, otherwise the best birds found were Purple-throated Sunangel, Rainbow Starfrontlet and Baron's Spinetail (Roger). It was quite windy near the pass, and we only did some short stops in the páramo zone. Red-rumped Bush-Tyrant was a very nice finding. The forest was more sizeable and fairly intact on the east side of the pass. Our timing – early afternoon - and a general shortage in time, was against us, but

at least we added Moustached Flowerpiercer and Smoky Bush-Tyrant to our list. The drive from here to Balsas was a hair rising experience. What a road! The topography is amazing...

#### **Balsas**

Buff-bridled Inca-Finch was easily found east of Balsas in the *Bombax* zone. From the bridge crossing the Marañón River we had plenty of Peruvian Pigeons, a single Marañón Thrush and Andean Emeralds. Two road kilometers west of the bridge we were fortunate to encounter no less than 32 Yellow-faced Parrotlets, a Black-necked Woodpecker and 2 Andean Condors. There is a simple hotel a kilometer north of Balsas proper. Ask for directions!

#### Hacienda Limón

A classic area for the highly localised Chestnut-backed Thornbird and Gray-winged Inca-Finch. The thornbird occurs around km markings 143-145 in remnant scrub and acacias in between agricultural fields. We had three birds at km 143. The Inca-Finch is found a few kilometers further on, around km marking 146-148. A pair was found by Samuel and Benny in a gully right by the road (I think it was at km 146.5), while the others had another pair on the slope above the road. The preferred habitat is dry scrub, which is confined to a narrow and rather obvious elevational zone.

## Celendín-Cajamarca road

Gunnar had made arrangements (without my knowledge!) with a local guide, Wilson, to accompany us in the Celendín/ Cajamarca area. We had not arranged a meeting place, so it was just pure luck that he showed up when we were having lunch in Celendín! Though on the expensive side (and hard to bargain with), Wilson proved to be essential to see the specialities we wanted.

Most of the original vegetation along the road has been converted to cropland or pasture. A single small patch of *Podocarpus* "forest" is found 1-1½ hours from Celendín. Here we had Black-crested Tit-Tyrant, Shining Sunbeam, Giant Hummingbird, Tyrian Metaltail, Grass Wren and Many-striped Canastero, while a Blackish Tapaculo was heard (we first thought it was Unicolored Tapaculo, but it apparently sounds quite different and should occur even farther to the south).

Cajamarca Antpitta, a certain split from Rufous Antpitta, is found in an obvious patch of pine/eucalyptus forest north of the road at Cruz Conga (no sign, but that's the name of this spreadout village), some 2 hours from Celendín. There are no other forest patches like this near the road, so it shouldn't be missed. It might be a good idea to try to speak with the land owner before entering the forest. He showed up while we were there and seemed pretty upset. Some of us got great looks of the antpitta (I was not among them), but as this seems to be about the only easily accessible site for the species along the road, my guess is that overuse of playback might lessen chances of actually seing the birds in the future.

About 3-4 kilometers from the antpitta site, at a sharp bend to the left, a broad trail leads uphill beside a house. This is where we saw our White-tailed Shrike-Tyrant, only a short walk from the road. Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant is fairly common, so watch every Shrike-Tyrant carefully. Near the pass, Rufous-webbed Tyrant was incredibly common. Other species seen during a few stops were Aplomado Falcon, Streak-throated Canastero and various Sierra-

Finches and Seedeaters. West of the pass we hardly stopped. The van was in a bad condition, and Adriano wanted to get to Cajamarca as early as possible to fix it. At least we added Mourning Sierra-Finch to our list.

## Río Chonta Valley

The Río Chonta Valley near Cajamarca is one of the best places known for Gray-bellied Comet. I can't really describe how to get there, but if you go to Cajamarca airport you should be able to find out further directions. The take-off road is just a few kilometers from the airport (after you've driven around the landing strip). From here, continue 7 kilometers along a rough road that goes right by the Río Chonta. Gray-bellied Comet is found here and beyond, primarily in flowering trees and bushes. Wilson even showed us an active nest! We had no problem finding the species, but a full day is sometimes necessary. This is a beautiful spot, and except for the Comet, look also for Giant Hummingbird, Black Metaltail, White-winged Cinclodes (along the river, at the northernmost limit of its range), Black-crested Tit-Tyrant and Jelski's Chat-Tyrant. Andean Swifts patroll the aerial surroundings.

## **Great Spinetail**

The rare Great Spinetail occurs near San Marcos c. 50 kilometers east of Cajamarca. It's a rough journey of c. 3 hours to get there. Wilson knows the place, but he hasn't seen the species himself. Peter was keen to go there, but we didn't have enough time, and the van was in a bad condition. Apparently there are also a few records of Great Spinetail near Hacienda Limón. The best area for the species, though, is further south around Chagual.

# Río Santa Valley

Perhaps the best route to approach Cordillera Blanca from the north is to follow the Río Santa Valley and Cañon de Pato along one of Peru's most spectacular and expensive roads. Cordillera Negra has vast mineral deposits, and that's the reason this road was built in the first place. For example, coal is taken directly from the steep mountain sides! Birds are very sparse here, but we managed to find a Peregrine Falcon during a photo stop. The rare Pale-tailed Canastero (an undescribed form, possibly a separate species) is found in cacti above 1800 meters. We didn't even try to see it, because of lack of time.

## Huascarán NP, Cordillera Blanca

A spectacular national park! We stayed in Yungay and birded the Llanganuco area one late afternoon and most of the day after. During this time we managed to find most of the area's specialities. It takes 30-40 minutes to reach the first lake from Yungay. The polylepis forest here and along the Doña Josefa trail hold many nice species like Plain-tailed Warbling-Finch, Rainbow Starfrontlet, Striated Earthcreeper, Rusty-crowned Tit-Spinetail, Baron's Spinetail, Stripe-headed Antpitta (very easy to see!), Pied-crested Tit-Tyrant, Jelski's Chat-Tyrant, Tit-like Dacnis and Rufous-eared Brush-Finch.

The second lake have many of the common Andean waterbirds, including Andean Goose, Crested Duck, Puna Teal and Puna Ibis. Beyond the lake in the valley to your left there is scrub and polylepis forest favored by the rare White-cheeked Cotinga (early morning gives the best chance), Green-headed Hillstar, Black Metaltail, Ancash Tapaculo, D'Orbigny's Chat-Tyrant, Giant Conebill (dip) and most of the species mentioned for the lower polylepis

area. Higher still, chances increase to encounter Blue-mantled and Olivaceous Thornbills. Rare species that occur in the Cordillera Blanca include Purple-backed Sunbeam, Graybellied Comet, Ash-breasted Tit-Tyrant and White-tailed Shrike-Tyrant, but there are no sites for them. There are many opportunities, though, for exploration of this vast and beautiful area.

## Recuay-Aija, Cordillera Negra

To get to San Damian, we had to pass the Cordillera Negra on the Recuay-Huarmey road. According to Adriano, Pale-tailed Canastero is found also above Recuay. We searched for it in the most extensive area of cacti we could find. No canasteros, but wonderful views of Cordillera Blanca and lots of other birds, incuding Giant Hummingbird, Spot-billed Ground-Tyrant and numerous finches and seedeaters.

At about 4200 m the agricultural land gives way to fairly intact, dry bunch grass. Here, at c. 4300 m (09° 44′ 22.5′′ S, 77° 29′ 59.94 W), Carl suddenly spotted two tinamous walking through a small semiopen area of grass some 50 meters away. We initially drew the logic conclusion that they were Ornate Tinamous, but when we walked out to flush them they showed characteristics of Kalinowski's Tinamou, a bird so rare that it is practically unknown in life! The birds flew down into a deep gully, but we managed to flush one of the birds again, unfortunately without Benny being able to videotape it. Although this is only a sight record we are convinced that our identification is correct, supported by later research of about all material available on the species. Except for the tinamous, we also found Aplomado Falcon, Gray-breasted Seedsnipe, Puna Snipe, Plain-breasted Earthcreeper, Streak-throated Canastero and Páramo Pipit in the area. From Aija on the west slope of the cordillera, the road continues (the turn-off is just before you enter the town) westwards and becomes yet another hair rising creation. May the best driver be behind the wheel...

#### San Damian

It is impossible to reach San Damian in the morning if you start out in Recuay. Even from Huarmey it takes 2-3 hours to get there. We arrived around 1 pm and thus spent the afternoon on site. A man from the village guided us, but it should be enough if someone point out the direction. It takes 1-1½ hour to reach the forest scrub, a 5 km walk with an ascent of 500 meters or so. We found most of the specialities, though unfortunately only three of us got to see the main target Russet-bellied Spinetail. Among the best species found were also Andean Tinamou, Oasis Hummingbird, Piura Chat-Tyrant, Peruvian Martin and Great Inca-Finch. Other possibilities include Streaked Tit-Spinetail (fairly common), Rufous-breasted Warbling-Finch (rare?) and Raimondi's Yellow-Finch (irregular).

The spinetail is found in thick undergrowth, so chances of seing it increase the higher you get up the slope. Goats and livestock have destroyed much of the understorey in the lower part. The other species aren't that demanding, though Piura Chat-Tyrant probably occur at higher densities in undisturbed habitat.

## **Puerto Huarmey**

A convenient site just south of Huarmey, which is sign posted. Seasonal wetlands and coastal habitats can yield a good mix of shorebirds, Humboldt current species and oasis birds. Our brief visit gave i.e. Red-legged Cormorant, Black Skimmer, Blackish Oystercatcher, Snowy Plover, Baird's Sandpiper and Elegant Tern. Great Grebe can be seen as well.

# **Species list**

This species list is based on my personal observations. Additional observations have been included at least for the more interesting species, but the list is not complete. The group split up quite a lot, so each of us missed quite a few species. Personally I missed 25 species on the list, but few of them were that important. The only really hurting dips for me were Russetbellied Spinetail, Blue-fronted Lancebill, Fiery-throated Fruiteater and Jelski's Chat-Tyrant.

Scarlet-fronted Parakeet is confined to the Balsas region, while both the nominate type and *alticola* of Mitred Parakeet occur in the Chachapoyas area. The two forms occur sympatrically and differ in several aspects. Thus they are most likely separate species. Race *minor* of Scarlet-fronted Parakeet, which should occur here according to most literature, is similar to *frontalis*, which has a red wingbend and extensive red crown. Our birds had red foreheads only, and no red in the wings.

**Blue Whale** *Balaenoptera musculus* 13/7 2 Callao Pelagic. Majestic creatures! They were seen rather shortly but well. Rare in Peru, not seen on earlier pelagics with Kolibri Expeditions. Humpback and Killer Whales are the most oftenly encountered whales.
