INFORMATION ON THE SITES VISITED

General note: almost all sites visited are well covered in the booklet "A Birdwatchers' Guide to The Gambia" (see above), hence here only some additional comment is given.

Kotu Creek Course, Kotu ponds and Casino cycle track

From the bridge over the Kotu Creek excellent views could be obtained daily of 10+ wader species (incl. confiding Senegal Thick-Knees), most of the heron and egret species, Hamerkops, Sacred Ibis, and many passerine species. The rice fields and wet areas between the Kotu Creek and the Casino cycle track were rather rich in birds. The Kotu Ponds contained quite a number of wader species in addition to four Painted Snipes, 60 African Jacana and some Little Grebes.



Abuko Nature Reserve

Two visits to this small but very attractive forest reserve gave almost all target species, incl. Green and Violet Turacoes, Ahanta Francolin, African Pied Hornbill, Giant Kingfisher, both African Paradise and Red-bellied Paradise Flycatchers, Common Wattle-eye, Green Hylia, Yellow-breasted Apalis, Little Greenbul, Buff-spotted Woodpecker, Collared Sunbird, Western Bluebill, greater Honeyguide and Werreaux's Eagle Owl. Green Vervet and Western Red Colobus Monkeys.

Brufut Woods

Also Brufut Woods turned out to be a very good place for birding. It contains areas of relatively undisturbed savannah woodland harbouring many attractive species. Here we found e.g. Black-crowned Tchagra, Swallow-tailed Bee-eater, Verreaux's Eagle Owl (one family), Sriped Kingfisher, Bearded Barbet, Lanner, Klaas's Cuckoo and Diedriks Cuckoo.



Marakissa

It is a forested area that can be reached through Brikama and past (3 km south of) Marakissa village. Marakissa River Camp, situated along the small river is a nice place. We enjoyed some drinks and food here. We saw Black Scimitarbill, Lesser Honeyguide, Greater Honeyguide, Cardinal Woodpecker, Red-Shouldered Cuckoo Shrike, and Broad Billed Roller. Some good raptors were also seen here, incl. African Hawk-eagle.

Yundum

This area of relatively undisturbed savannah woodland harbours many attractive species. We saw: Senegal Batis, Western Violet Sunbird, Yellow Penduline Tit, Pied-winged Swallow, Vieillot's Barbetand and Lanner.

Pirang

The shrimp farm and surrounding mangroves harbour a good number of wetland species. The most famous bird species of Pirang is the threatened Black-crowned Crane, of which we found a single pair. Other birds of interest here were Pink-backed Pelicans, Blue-cheeked Bee-eater, Yellow-billed Stork and Quail Finch. Also various swallow and wagtail species were seen here, besides the well-known waders and raptors.

Tendaba, Georgetown, Basse, Georgetown, Kaur, Tendaba

The first day of the 4-days' inland trip we drove from Kotu to Tendaba with three major stops, Mandina Bah, Pirang and at the Kampanti rice fields. The latter stop was a very good one, as again a lot of raptor species were seen here. Due to bad road conditions the (bumpy...) drive from Kotu to Tendaba took rather long, but beyond Tendaba the road became better, with fewer potholes. The late afternoon/evening we spent in Kiang West, with species as White-shouldered Black Tit, Brurbu, White-rumped Seedeater, Long-tailed nightjar and Four-banded Sandgrouse.

At Tendaba we stayed at the Tendaba Bush Camp and I made a night walk over the Tendaba "airfield" and saw over 100 fruitbats and one African Palm civet (a mammal belived to form a monotypic family) up in a tree. The next day we made a "creek tour" from 08.00 – 12.30 h using a small motorboat, exploring two interconnected mangrove-fringed creeks at the northern bank of the Gambia River. Interesting birds seen during this creek tour were Woolly-necked Stork, 5 (!) White-backed Night Heron, Mouse-brown Sunbird, Pygmy Sunbird, Copper Sunbird, Blue-breasted Kingfisher and African Finfoot. In the afternoon we drove to Georgetown staying one night. On the way we made several stops produced Chestnut-backed Sparrow-Lark and 2 Bronze-winged Coursers. The bushfires we passed gave us a lot of swallows and an amazing gathering of 100

Abyssinian Rollers.

The next day we drove from Georgetown to Basse, where good views of 1 Egyptian Plovers. Approx. 25 km east of Georgetown we visited the Bansang quarry containing a large Red-throated Bee-eater colony. Then we went via Georgetown to Kaur (North Bank), with a major stop at a marshy/ricefield of Kaur. On our way we saw Little Green Bee-eater and Marabou Stork.

The Kaur fields were disappointing, due to the fact that they were mainly dry. At Bambatenda ferry we saw a locust swarm which darkened the sky. Our guide had never seen something like it. A short night walk in Tendaba produced one female Standardwinged Nightjar.

The next day we went back to African village, with stops at Kampanti and Pirang. At Kampanti again a lot of raptors appeared such as African Hawk-eagle and Whitebacked Vulture,
