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## Introduction

This was Robert's second and Patrik's first birding trip to Texas. This had some consequences for how we planned the trip. We decided on a somewhat more target species based trip, compared to how most first time visitors probably plan their trip. Consequently we decided to focus on the Rio Grande area and include Big Bend, but not to try for Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl at San Miguelito Ranch, Whooping Cranes in the Rockport area, Tropical Parula in the King Ranch area or do a Yellow Rail walk, to be able to focus more on ABA-rarities as Audubon's Oriole, Hook-billed Kite and Colima Warbler. Undoubtedly our trip gave so much more than the target species; we managed to really enjoy the breadth of two weeks of birding in Texas in spring in different habitats and with loads of birds of many species. Texas is a place to return to, again and again!

We started in the Rockport area, where we enjoyed the first fall-out of the trip, seeing all in all 21 warbler species. We then continued via CR 239 and Audubon's Oriole to South Padre Island where it was very slow compared to when Robert was here in 2007. From there we continued to the Lower Rio Grande Valley, with all the expected stops including Sabal Palms, Bentsen, Quinta Matzlan, Santa Ana and Salineno. We were highly successful here with our target species, including Hook-billed Kite and Muscovy Duck. From Salineno we drove all the way to Big Bend, only birding at Amistad Reservoir on the way. We enjoyed Big Bend NP for one day and were highly successful with our main target species here, i.e. Colima Warbler. We had planned to try for Montezuma Quail and Buff-breasted Flycatcher in Davis Mountain State Park after this, not far from Alpine, but unfortunately the wildfires had caused a closure of the state park. Therefore we had to be satisfied with some sightseeing in the town of Fort Davis, after which we went to High Island via Lost Maples. We spent five days in the High Island area; we had two fabulous fall-out days here, seeing all in all 29 warbler species! The last day was spent in W.G. Jones State Forest where we easily saw all target species, including Red-cockaded Woodpecker. All in all we saw 325 species. The number of species seen is somehow interesting if one considers when in April to visit Texas, something that is pretty difficult to decide on. After the trip we were in contact with another Swedish "birding team" who had visited Texas from April 7 to 21. They visited the same places that we visited, but saw 42 less species. We have included a comparison between our result and theirs as Appendix 1. From this comparison one gets the impression that some species are easier during the earlier part of April, i.e. Common Loon, Northern Pintail, American Wigeon, Merlin and Bonaparte's Gull, while the second half of April seems better for larger number of warbler species, including Colima Warbler, and Hudsonian Godwit.

We pre-booked three motel nights in Ingleside (April 15-18) and five motel nights in Winnie (April 24-29), but the other seven nights we easily found accommodation in motels the same day as we intended to stay there. Since we visited Winnie at prime time we booked ahead, and this proved to be wise, considering that almost all motels in the area were fully booked when we tried to find a motel two months ahead of the trip. One doesn't really need to book ahead in the Rockport-Ingleside area, but we did so out of convenience.

We flew with Lufthansa to Houston from Gothenburg via Frankfurt, and home again with Lufthansa from Houston to Gothenburg via London and Frankfurt. We paid 6225 Swedish kronor (kr) per person for the return flight. We rented a car from Alamo at George Bush International Airport, through Holiday Autos, and paid 4975 kr in all for fifteen days.

Prior to the trip we got some useful information from Jon McIntyre, a birder from Port Aransas who runs birding tours. We were told by him about a hotspot for Audubon's Oriole close to Orange Grove at CR 239¹. From Jon we also got to know that Black Rail is possible

at Port Aransas Birding Center in Port Aransas, where they can be found all year round, but most easily in spring when they are more vocal. They are most easily heard early morning, late afternoon or night, according to Jon. We were successful with the Audubon's Oriole, but it was far too windy when we tried for the Black Rail.

# The trip day by day

#### APRIL 15

After a long trip from Gothenburg via Frankfurt we finally arrive to Houston's George Bush Intercontinental Airport at 2 pm. After spending almost an hour in the queues for the Homeland Security passport controls, we are at last ready for picking up our car from Alamo and heading out on the Texas roads. After a not too exciting hamburger meal at one of the chain restaurants along the highway, we reach **Katy Prairie**, or to be more specific Cochran Road, in the evening. We spend almost two hours here, enjoying large flocks of *Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks*, two *Northern Bobwhites*, large numbers of *Upland Sandpipers* and a singing *Grasshopper Sparrow*. But the highlight of the evening is when all of the sudden a flock of 150 *Franklin's Gulls* fly in from the southeast towards us, passing us very close and continuing northwest. What a surprise and what an experience! After an hour at Katy Mills Outlet close to Katy Prairie, we continue all the way down to Ingleside, where we arrive to our prebooked motel after midnight, being exhausted to say the least.

#### **APRIL 16**

After a few hours of heavy sleep we are more than keen to start birding in the Rockport area. Already at the parking lot of the motel we see species like Crested Caracara and Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, both new species for Patrik. Our first real birding stop is at Rockport Demo Bird Garden, where the birding is surprisingly slow. From there we continue to Goose Island State Park where we spend the rest of the day, apart from a lunch break in town. It doesn't take long before we understand that it is a fall-out day; we later get to know that it is a fantastic fall-out day in Port Aransas. One warbler species is added to another, for example Blue-winged-, Magnolia-, Blackburnian-, Worm-eating-, Prothonotary-, Kentucky- and Hooded Warbler, all in all 17 warbler species during the day. Other interesting species include Buff-bellied-, Black-chinned- and Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Eastern Wood-Pewee, Alder Flycatcher, Black-crested Titmouse, Rufous-crowned Sparrow and Hooded- and Orchard Oriole. During a lunch break in Rockport we add two breeding Tropical Kingbirds at H-E-B Pharmacy. Late afternoon we bird at the end of Trout Street watching the many birds in Aransas Bay and St. Charles Bay, where we add species like American Oystercatcher, Willet, Whimbrel, Short-billed

Dowitcher and Royal Terns. We end the day with a fantastic meal at Charlotte Plummer's seafood restaurant at Fulton Harbor.

#### APRIL 17

The first part of this day is spent in the **Ingleside area**, and although no really important species are seen, the birding is varied and pretty exciting. We start at Johnson Avenue Pond, where we see a *Redhead*. From here we continue on Collins Lane, where two *Green Herons* are seen. Then we go past McCampbell Airport and scan the fields, from where we see *White-tailed Hawks* and a *Greater Roadrunner*. After this we visit the birding platform at Kenny Lane (**Whitney Lake Marsh Park**), where we enjoy *Pectoral Sandpipers*, *Least Sandpipers*, *Long-billed Dowitchers* and a *Wilson's Snipe*. We meet two American birders who give us some valuable information considering how to separate Long-billed- from Short-billed Dowitchers. Live Oak City Park is described as an exciting place in the guide, but it proves to be very slow indeed, why we leave after only half an hour. After an enjoyable lunch at a Mexican restaurant north of the park along FM-1069, we head for Port Aransas.

It is with great excitement we enter the area of Joan and Scott Holt Paradise **Pond**. On a small whiteboard filled with observations we read that a female *Rusty* Blackbird has been seen at the site the same morning, a would-be new tick for the both of us. Unfortunately we are not able to find the bird despite a couple of hours of focused searching, but we are able to enjoy Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Acadian Flycatcher, Philadelphia Vireo, Veery, Swainson's- and Gray-cheeked Thrush, Orange-crowned-, Prairie-, Magnolia-, Kentucky-Hooded and Warbler and Swamp Sparrow in this tiny area. We are told that all those exciting species are only a fraction of what were seen yesterday, when the pond area was crammed with birds because of a major fall-out. From here we continue to Port Aransas Birding Center, where we encounter Solitary Sandpiper, Western Kingbird, Ruby-crowned Kinglet and Blackburnianand Yellow-throated Warbler. We also meet a Polish-American birder/photographer, Marcin Kojtka, and his wife Daria, a couple we are

to meet at High Island again later during the trip. After some time here Robert drives back to the Paradise Pond again for another try for the Rusty Blackbird, but again no luck ... At dusk we listen for *Black Rails*, but unfortunately it is very windy, which might be the reason behind why we don't hear any.

#### **APRIL 18**

Via Orange Grove we drive early in the morning to CR 239 from Ingleside. Almost immediately after the road makes a hard right turn we park the car and start walking along this desolate county road. We spend a couple of hours walking along it, and it is certainly worth the time spent: Fulvous Whistling-Duck, White-tailed Kite, Harris's Hawk, Northern Bobwhite, Scaled Quail, Wild Turkey, Common Ground-Dove, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Green Jay, Long-billed Thrasher and Pyrrhuloxia are among all the interesting species seen. The highlight of the morning, though, and one of the main targets species of the trip, Audubon's Oriole, is found by Patrik to the east of the road in a grove after more than two hours walking along the road, and when we are starting to despair. What a relief!

After lunch at Whataburger in Kingsville we continue all the way down to **South Padre Island**. We check in at a motel, and continue to the newly built South Padre Island Birding and Nature Center<sup>2</sup> were we pay an entrance fee to be able to access the boardwalk. The photo possibilities are great and we also see some exciting species, i.e. *Clapper Rail* and *Sora*, and we get great comparison possibilities concerning *Northern-* vs. *Louisiana Waterthrush*. The boardwalk ends by the Convention Center where it is obviously slow. Scanning the mudflats west of the center brings *Snowy Plover*. Returning to the Center we start talking to some photographers sitting in front of some small trees. When we ask them if they've seen anything exciting they say that nothing much is around, except for a *Northern Parula*, a *Warbling Vireo* and a *Blackpoll Warbler*. To us those are great news – the Blackpoll Warbler would be a new tick for both of us. It doesn't take long before it turns up at a cut orange placed in a tree. Yeahhh! Very satisfied we enjoy another great hamburger meal at Whataburger close to the motel.

#### APRIL 19

After a good night's sleep we start down by the Convention Center South Padre Island. "Unfortunately" it is a nice and sunny day, why the birds we see mainly are repeats from yesterday, but the Blackpoll Warbler is still as stunning as yesterday, and a Sedge Wren is the first (and only one) for the trip. After this we continue to South Padre Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary at Sheep Head's Rd, where it is as slow, why we decide to leave the island. We continue Sabal Palm to Sanctuary, 45 minutes away. When we reach the sanctuary it is hot, and bird activity consequently low, but we manage to find some interesting species, i.e. Least Grebe, Plain Chachalaca and White-tipped Dove. During the oppressive heat of the Rio Grande Valley afternoon we spend a few hours enjoying shopping in the air-conditioned shops in the Rio Grande Valley Premium Outlet east of Mercedes, a fabulous place if you are interested in buying

clothes. With the trunk filled with new clothes we thereafter drive to **Bentsen**<sup>3</sup> where we arrive at dusk. We walk from the parking area to the Kingfisher Overlook and back. We are rewarded with *Elf Owl, Eastern Screech-Owl, Common Pauraque, Common Poorwill, Chuckwill's-widow* and *Lesser Nighthawk*.

## April 20

We have detailed driving directions to **Quinta Matzlan**<sup>4</sup>, but nevertheless we end up at McAllen Miller International Airport several times, and we are on the edge of giving up when we all the sudden find our way to the birding site by pure luck. We are the first visitors to the site, which feels like a good sign. From the parking area there is a straight asphalted road leading up towards the mansion. Along this stretch of the road we manage to find both *Green Parakeets* and *Red-crowned Parrots*, the main target species here. We walk around the small area for a while, seeing among others *Altamira Oriole* and *Clay-colored Robin*.

There has been a *Crimson-collared Grosbeak* for weeks in **Allen Williams Wildscape** in Pharr, a bird that is supposed to be generally most active from 9-10:30 am, why we decide to try for it before we head on to Santa Ana. The bird has not been reported the last two days, but considering how long the bird has been there we hope that the reason behind this is that no birders have tried for it. The wildscape is a nice place with trees and benches in a small garden. We spend almost two hours here really keen on seeing the bird, but unfortunately we have to leave the area unsuccessful, three *Lesser Goldfinchs* being the only thing close to exciting being seen.

It is already very hot when we reach Santa Ana<sup>5</sup>. Some time in the airconditioned Visitor Center is a relief, but we soon walk down towards the Hawk Tower. On the way we see two Clay-colored Robins at exactly the same place where Robert saw them 2007. Since Hook-billed Kite is the main target species here we soon walk the stairs up to the Hawk Tower, we from where start scanning for soaring raptors. After some time Patrik decides to take a walk in the surrounding area. He is very excited when he comes back, having seen Green Kingfishers and Groove-billed Ani. All in all we spend a few hours in the extreme heat up in the tower, but unfortunately this is resultless. We decide walk along a heading west from the Visitors Center, but it is almost zero bird activity now, and after a while we decide to give up and turn back.

It is now time for a second visit to **Bentsen**. This time we walk to the Hawk Tower. It is a nice, calm evening. Close to the tower we react to the song of a *Northern Beardless-Tyrannulet*, and it doesn't take long before we have seen the bird. From the Hawk Tower we start scanning the open water areas and the sky. A *Ringed Kingfisher* is the first for the trip. A massive raptor migration is going on overhead. Swarms of *Mississippi Kites* fill the sky, and two *White-tailed Kites* are seen repeatedly. Suddenly Robert see two birds soaring close by, to

the northeast of the tower with very distinct shapes – two *Hook-billed Kites*. Fabulous! Patrik also finds an exciting Falcon, that he thinks might be an Aplomado Falcon, but unfortunately Robert does not see the bird good enough to confirm the species. The return walk towards the parking lot yields the same species as yesterday evening.

#### APRIL 21

After spending the night in a motel in Roma we start really early in the morning to be able to be at **Salineno** at dawn. It is still dark when we arrive at the little church in the small town, where we park our car and walk down to the river. The first light reveals good numbers of *Lesser Nighthawks* hunting over the river. It doesn't take long before we see a *Muscovy Duck* flying east along the river. Yes! Only five minutes after this the first of several groups of birders drives down to the river. Another (or maybe the same?) *Muscovy Duck* comes flying west, and most of the newly arrived birders get to see this bird. Two *Ringed Kingfishers* fly back and forth along the river all the time. Scanning west we also manage to find *Gray Hawk*, and two Finnish birders point out two *Red-billed Pigeons*.

Now it is time for the long and tiring drive towards Big Bend NP. After lunch in Nuevo Laredo we continue all the way to **Amistad Reservoir** where we make a short but enjoyable birding stop. Down by the lake side there are plenty of birds, among which the most noticeable are *Eared Grebes, Vermilion Flycatchers, Bell's Vireo, Painted Buntings* and *Yellow-headed Blackbirds*. Between Amistad and Sanderson along Hwy 90 we drive into a really scary thunderstorm. The strokes of lightening hit the ground along the highway all the time, and it lights some fires, of which one is right along the road ... All of the sudden the windscreen is hit by huge hailstones, and we feel afraid that they will crack it. We are in the middle of nowhere and have not seen any houses for miles, so there is nowhere to stop really, why we feel that we have to continue driving. After half an hour we reach the first

town for miles, Sanderson, where we decide to stay the night, despite the original plan to drive all the way to Marathon. The black skies and the tiredness after the exhaustive drive make this an easy decision!

#### APRIL 22

After a few hours of badly needed sleep, we start the drive towards **Big Bend National Park**, where we arrive at dawn. At the parking lot at the Visitor Center at Chisos Mountain Lodge we meet the two Finnish birders from yesterday's visit to Salineno. They have slept in their car, and already done some birding

when we arrive. Finland-Sweden 1-0 ... Together with them we start the beautiful hike upwards along Pinnacles Trail<sup>6</sup>, where a lot of new trip species are seen: *Band-tailed Pigeon*,

Blue-throated Hummingbird, Acorn Woodpecker, Say's Phoebe, Mexican Jay, Violet Green Swallow, Canyon Wren, Black-tailed Gnatcatcher, Hermit Thrush, Virginia's-, Townsend's- and Wilson's Warbler, Hepatic Tanager, Spotted- and Canyon Towhee, Vesper Sparrow, Scott's Oriole, Dusky Flycatcher and White-throated Swift. But the highlight, of course, is when Robert finally hears a singing Colima Warbler, and it doesn't take long before the four of us can enjoy great views of the bird. Good birds along Boot Canyon Trail include White-headed- and Redbreasted Nuthatch and Black-throated Gray Warbler. A suggested lunch stop makes the Finnish birders look like question marks. Lunch? It is very hot and we have walked upwards for hours. They haven't brought anything to eat (Finland-Sweden 1-1), so we share what we have brought with them. Soon after lunch we reach Boot Springs, where we sit down for an hour or so enjoying all the exciting birds that come to drink from the spring: Painted Redstart, Black-headed Grosbeak, and Townsend's Solitaire. After this it is "only" the walk down towards the Visitor Center left, along Colima Trail and Laguna Meadows Trail. It is extremely hot and it doesn't take long before our water supplies are empty, although we felt that we brought a lot of water. The lack of water and food and the heat make the walk a true challenge to Robert, who is totally exhausted when he reaches the parking lot half an hour after Patrik who has run (!) parts of the trail.

It is now late afternoon and not many hours left before dusk, why we head as soon as possible to **Rio Grande Village**. The area where the *Common Black-Hawk* pair breeds is very small, but it takes almost an hour before we find one of the birds perched in a tree. This is the second great bird of the day; this tick feels fantastic partly because it was one of the few species we didn't find on our California/Arizona/Nevada trip in 2005. From here we drive all the way up to Alpine, and to Robert, who is the only one with a driver's license, this is a true challenge, exhausted after a very intense day. One of those experiences where you have to fight really hard not to fall asleep while driving...

#### APRIL 23

This ninth morning of the trip we do something as unusual and "strange" as having a well-needed lie-in. This means that we can "enjoy" the classical American motel breakfast – donuts, pancakes, milk, cereals and "coffee". Driving north along hwy 118 we make a stop at some ponds on the right hand side of the road. This proves to be a most fruitful stop: Wood Duck, Cinnamon Teal, Black Phoebe, Varied Bunting, MacGillivray's Warbler, Black-chinned Sparrow, Brewer's Blackbird and Brewer's Sparrow.

Since Davis Mountains State Park unfortunately is closed due to the wildfires plaguing this area of Texas we have to do with some sightseeing instead. We make a short visit to Fort Davis National Historic Site, a place that to Europeans is not very impressing. We are more impressed by the lunch at a cosy Mexican restaurant in town!

From Fort Davis it is time for another long drive, this time to Uvalde, which we reach after twilight has set in.

#### **APRIL 24**

We drive from Uvalde an hour and a half before dawn to be able to catch the first light at Lost Maples State Natural Area. When we have reached the parking lot, we start our birding walk following the East Trail towards the camping ground and ponds area. We hear several Golden-cheeked Warblers along this stretch of the trail, but the best observations are made when we take a short detour up the West Trail. One bird comes extremely close, but unfortunately the bird is moving fast and gone when we are ready with our cameras to take pictures of it. Other birds seen along the trail towards the camping ground are Eastern Wood-Pewee, Acadian Flycatcher, Black Phoebe, Yellow-throated Vireo, Western Scrub-Jay, Carolina Chickadee, Rock Wren and Blue Grosbeak. Up by the ponds there are a lot of noisy campers, but just a short walk up past the big pond along Can Creek Trail it is more quiet and we manage to find both Louisiana Waterthrush, Green Kingfisher and surprisingly enough a Audubon's Oriole. From the camping ground we follow the steep East Trail up to the ridge. Up there several Black-capped Vireos are singing, but they are really difficult to get good views of, and it is almost impossible to take photographs of them. Up here we also manage

to find Field Sparrows. With all the targets species seen within a two hours walk we feel really satisfied and return to the car. By the parking lot there are some feeders that are frequented by Blackchinned Hummingbirds Clay-colored Sparrows. From Lost Maples we drive to Utopia where we walk some of the streets and also make a visit to the city park, mainly looking for American Robin, unfortunately fruitless. We are more than happy though to find a huge flock of Cedar Waxwings. Now it is time for the long drive

to Winnie. Since it is Easter Day there a lot of cars on the highway, but everything, including a lunch stop at a Denny's, run smoothly. Driving through Houston is actually very easy and straightforward. We easily find Winnie Inn & Suites, a really nice hotel perfectly situated in Winnie.

#### APRIL 25

We awake filled with great expectations – High Island is waiting. Original as we are, we start at **Boy Scout Woods**. Due to southerly winds birds are few and far between, but we keep on walking up and down the trails, and eventually it pays off. To begin with Patrik discovers four *Magnificent Frigatebirds* flying over the small wood, which is unexpected to say the least. Furthermore, and even more unexpected, a *Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher* is found by Robert. He has seen the species once before in Arizona, but even there it was scarce, and



he feels sceptical about the identification however much it looks like one. After having checked the books available he is sure about the identification. Unfortunately Patrik has not seen the bird. Together we start walking the trails again searching for the bird. It doesn't take long before we meet Marcin,

the Polish/American guy we met in Port Aransas, and a few other birders obviously focused on searching for something extraordinary. When we ask them what they are searching for the answer is Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher! It feels great to know that also other birders have seen and identified the bird, but re-finding it is a demanding task. Robert manages to see the bird briefly two times more, but when Patrik reaches the spot it is gone again. Since also Patrik has seen the bird in Arizona we decide to leave the site and try our success at Smith Oaks instead. Also here it is slow, but a Yellow-billed Cuckoo is somewhat exciting. After a wonderful lunch at the hamburger restaurant at Gulfway motel along Hwy 124 we bird Bolivar Peninsula. It's very windy indeed. Along the beach we manage to find a lot of Common- and Black Terns. Bob Road is supposed to be good for shorebirds, according to information on the whiteboard at Boy Scout Woods, and although it's by no means fantastic we manage to find some good species here, including Wilson's Plover, Pectoral- and Semipalmated Sandpiper and Caspian Terns. Walking along the dirt road surrounding the ponds we get fantastic views of Clapper Rails and Seaside Sparrows. Port Bolivar Ferry Landing is an area from which it is supposed to be possible to see Magnificent Frigatebirds, and surely enough it doesn't take long before we find three birds. Before it gets too dark we try our luck along Fairview Road, along which there is supposed to be flooded rice fields according to information on the whiteboard at Boy Scout Woods. There are amazing numbers of Whimbrels here, but our main target species here, Hudsonian Godwit, proves to be scarcer. After scanning the fields over and over again Robert finally manages to find eight Godwits. Not overwhelmed but definitely satisfied we end the day at Al-T's Seafood & Steakhouse, opposite the motel, where we try the local Cajun food. Patrik is not impressed by his seafood gumbo soap, but Robert's meal is price worthy.

#### APRIL 26

Sadly enough it is another day with southerly winds, and therefore we have no hopes for a most longed-for fall-out. Just as yesterday we start at **Boy Scout Woods**. Unfortunately it

is very slow today too; apart from Solitary Sandpiper nothing exciting at all is seen. From the High Island area we drive the short distance to Anahuac<sup>7</sup>. This was a most exciting site when Robert visited Texas in April 2007, why we have high expectations, but today everything is different, partly due to the destruction caused by Hurricane Ike. The visitor center was destroyed by the hurricane, and a temporary one is housed in a cabin. Fulvous Whistling-Ducks, Gull-billed Terns and Stilt Sandpipers are observed at the small pond next to the visitor center. Close by we find some White-crowned Sparrows. White-fronted Moist Soil Units and Salt Cedars are almost completely dry, why there are almost no shorebirds or waders. We start by walking to the watch tower at Salt Cedars. We then return to the visitor center and keep on walking along the dirt road around Shoveler Pond. The ditch parallel to the road is productive: American- and Least Bittern, Purple Gallinule, King Rail, Sora and singing Marsh Wrens. The surrounding fields are also somewhat productive: Northern Harriers and loads of Dickcissels. When checking the weather forecast for tomorrow back at the motel we feel very excited – the winds are going to change from south to north!!! During the night we dream sweet dreams about a fall-out!

#### APRIL 27

That the winds have changed is obvious – chilly northerly winds! Great! Since we know that the action at High Island will begin later during the morning, we start at the **North Fork of Taylor's Bayou**. The bridge is closed for traffic, why we park our car west of it. It is exciting to bird in an area with a lot of local nesting birds, like *Red-bellied Woodpecker*, *Blue Jay*, *Louisiana Waterthrush* and *Prothonotary*– and *Swainson's Warbler*. The latter is seen and heard at exactly the same spot as in 2007, east of the bridge.

Magical and stunning are two suitable words to describe the birding at Boy Scout Oaks Smith Woods and today. That something is going on is obvious already when reaching High Island – the numbers of cars parked along 5th street have tripled since yesterday! We join the birders photographers lining 5th street watching the trees of the edge of Boy Scout Woods. We are

filled with epinephrine as we enjoy species such as Cape May-, Golden-winged-, Bay-breasted-, Chestnut-sided-, Magnolia-, Cerulean-, Blackburnian-, Blue-winged-, Palm-, Blackpoll-, Hooded-, Canada- and Yellow-throated Warbler and Philadelphia Vireo. We also see the Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher again. Smith Oaks is as loaded with birds, but there are less birders. We mostly get to see the same species as in Boy Scout Woods, but Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Ovenbird and Scarlet Tanager are new. We return to Boy Scout Woods where we bird until dusk. We spend some time in the photo blind, where we obtain good looks of Wood Thrush and White-throated Sparrow. When we sum the day we realize that we have seen an amazing number of 27 warbler species during one day!!!

#### **APRIL 28**

The decision to start in the High Island area is easy to make. The winds are still northerly and a wide variety of species remain, although the numbers are lower compared to yesterday. At **Boy Scout Woods** we see *Philadelphia Vireo*, *Veery*, *Blue-winged-*, *Golden-winged-*, *Chestnut-sided-*, *Magnolia-*, *Blackburnian-* and *Blackpoll Warbler* and *Ovenbird*. The highlight of the day, though, is undoubtedly the male *Black-throated Blue Warbler* at **Smith Oaks**.

After some time we feel that the crowds are far too big, and that we have seen almost everything we can expect here, why we decide to try **Bolivar Peninsula** instead. At **Rollover Pass** the most exciting species are *American White Pelican, American Oystercatcher, American Avocet* and *Ring-billed Gull.* From here we continue to **Bolivar Flats**. It is very nice to walk along the beach, and surprisingly enough we are almost alone here. Along the beach there are good amounts of shorebirds, gulls and terns, i.e. *Red Knot, Piping-, Semipalmated-* and *Wilson's Plover, Marbled Godwit* and approximately 500 *Least Terns.* We then decide to go searching fields for shorebirds, and we are fortunate enough to find three *American Golden-Plovers* at some grass fields and all in all eleven *Upland Sandpipers* at three different locations. We finish at dusk at **Yacht Basin Road**, where we succeed in finding one of the target species, *Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow*, before we are eaten alive by all the mosquitoes.

#### **APRIL 29**

Since we have been most fortunate in the High Island area it does actually not feel especially difficult to leave it for **Sabine Woods**. There are lots of birders here too, but they all say that compared to yesterday it is very slow today. Nevertheless we manage to find exciting species as Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Alder Flycatcher, Wood Thrush, Brown Thrasher, Blackpoll Warbler and Ovenbird.

After birding in Sabine Woods we do some last shopping at a mall in Beaumont before we head west towards Houston. Along the highway we make a stop at **Trinity River** between Liberty and Dayton. Our main target here is *Swallowed-tailed Kite*, and surely enough one is seen briefly by Patrik. Here we also find a few *Mississippi Kites* and the only *Belted Kingfisher* of the trip. From Liberty we then drive onwards all the way to The Woodlands, where we check into a motel.

#### APRIL 30

This is unfortunately our last day in Texas. The short drive from The Woodlands to W.G. Jones State Forest doesn't take more than ten minutes. We are the first visitors of the day at the site, and the visitor center is closed. We walk along the trails northwest of the visitor center. Compared to when Robert was here in 2007 we find all our target species much faster this time, and in a very limited area: Red-headed Woodpecker, Red-cockaded Woodpecker, Pileated Woodpecker, Brown-headed Nuthatch, Eastern Bluebird and Pine Warbler. After having left our car at the rental car return center we check-in at the rather chaotic George Bush International Airport.

# Northern Cardinal Cardinalis cardinalis (Röd kardinal)

Very common, observed every day of the trip.

# Black-headed Grosbeak Pheucticus melanocephalus (Svarthuvad kardinal)

10 in Big Bend NP 22/4.

## Rose-breasted Grosbeak Pheucticus ludovicianus (Brokig kardinal)

1 in Goose Island SP 16/4, 1 at Paradise Pond 17/4, 2-5 daily in the High Island area 25-28/4 and 2 in Sabine Woods 29/4.

#### Blue Grosbeak Guiraca caerulea (Blåtjocknäbb)

3 in Lost Maples 24/4, 1 in the High Island area 27/4 and 1 in Sabine Woods 29/4.

#### **Indigo Bunting** *Passerina cyanea* (Indigofink)

Common, observed nine days.

#### Varied Bunting Passerina versicolor (Brokfink)

1 at pond north of Alpine 23/4.

#### Painted Bunting Passerina ciris (Påvefink)

1 at CR 239 and 1 on South Padre Island 18/4, 3 at Amistad Reservoir 21/4, 5 in Big Bend NP 22/4, 3 at pond north of Alpine 23/4, 1 at Boy Scout Woods 25/4, 2 at Boy Scout Woods 27/4, 7 in the High Island area 28/4 and 2 in Sabine Woods 29/4.

## **Dickcissel** Spiza americana (Dickcissel)

1 at Salineno and 1 at Amistad Reservoir 21/4, 1 north of Alpine 23/4, 1 on the Bolivar Peninsula 25/4, 70, 15 and 10 respectively in the High Island area 26-28/4 and 1 in Sabine Woods 29/4.

## **Spotted Towhee** *Pipilo maculatus* (Fläckig busksparv)

6 in Big Bend NP 22/4.

## **Canyon Towhee** *Pipilo fuscus* (Kanjonbusksparv)

6 in Big Bend NP 22/4.

## **Olive Sparrow** *Arremonops rufivirgatus* (Olivsparv)

2 at Sabal Palm 19/4 and common in Lower Rio Grande 20-21/4.

## **Rufous-crowned Sparrow** *Aimophila ruficeps* (Rostkronad sparv)

4 in Goose Island SP 16/4 and 5 in Big Bend NP 22/4.

#### Cassin's Sparrow Aimophila cassinii (Cassinsparv)

2 in the Ingleside area 17/4, common along CR 239 18/4 and at Salineno 21/4.

# Black-throated Sparrow Amphispiza bilineata (Svartstrupig sparv)

1 at Salineno 21/4 and 2 north of Alpine 23/4.

# **Black-chinned Sparrow** *Spizella atrogularis* (Chaparralsparv)

2 north of Alpine 23/4.

# Field Sparrow Spizella pusilla (Åkersparv)

4 at Lost Maples 24/4.

## **Brewer's Sparrow** *Spizella breweri* (Brewersparv)

2 north of Alpine 23/4

# Clay-colored Sparrow Spizella pallida (Lerfärgad sparv)

5 at Lost Maples 24/4.

#### **Chipping Sparrow** *Spizella passerina* (Tjippsparv)

2 in the Ingleside area 17/4, 15 at Amistad Reservoir 21/4, common in Big Bend NP and around Alpine 22-23/4 and at Lost Maples 24/4.

# **Grasshopper Sparrow** Ammodramus savannarum (Gräshoppsparv)

1 at Katy Prairie 15/4 and common along CR 239 18/4.

#### Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow Ammodramus nelson (Nelsons sparv)

1 on the Bolivar Peninsula 28/4.

#### **Seaside Sparrow** *Ammodramus maritimis* (Kustsparv)

9 on the Bolivar Peninsula 25/4, 2 at Anahuac 26/4 and 1 on the Bolivar Peninsula 28/4.

#### **Savannah Sparrow** *Passerculus sandwichensis* (Gulbrynad grässparv)

Pretty common, observed six days.

#### **Vesper Sparrow** *Pooecetes gramineus* (Aftonsparv)

1 in Big Bend NP 22/4.

#### **Lark Sparrow** *Chondestes grammacus* (Lärksparv)

15 along CR 239 18/4, 10 at Salineno 21/4, 2 at pond north of Alpine 23/4 and 2 at Sabine Woods 29/4.

## White-throated Sparrow Zonotrichia albicollis (Vitstrupig sparv)

1 in Boy Scout Woods 27/4.

# White-crowned Sparrow Zonotrichia leucophrys (Vitkronad sparv)

4 on South Padre Island 18/4 and 5 at Anahuac 26/4.

## **Song Sparrow** *Melospiza melodia* (Sångsparv)

1 in Utopia 24/4 and 1 at Anahuac 26/4.

## Lincoln's Sparrow Melospiza lincolnii (Lincolnsparv)

15 in Goose Island SP 16/4, 5 at Paradise Pond 17/4, 1 at Santa Ana 20/4, 1 at Lost Maples 24/4 and 2 in Sabine Woods 29/4.

# Swamp Sparrow Melospiza georgiana (Träsksparv)

3 at Port Aransas Birding Center 17/4.

## Western Meadowlark Sturnella neglecta (Västlig ängstrupial)

Common at Katy Prairie 15/4 and along CR 239 18/4.

# Eastern Meadowlark Sturnella magna (Östlig ängstrupial)

Common in suitable habitat, observed four of the days.

# **Brown-headed Cowbird** *Molothrus ater* (Brunhuvad kostare)

Common, observed twelve days.

#### **Bronzed Cowbird** *Molothrus aeneus* (Bronskostare)

1 in Rockport 16/4 and common in the Lower Rio Grande Valley 20-21/4.

## Yellow-headed Blackbird Xanthocephalus xanthocephalus (Gulhuvad trupial)

1 in the Ingleside area 17/4 and 2 at Amistad Reservoir 21/4.

## Red-winged Blackbird Agelaius phoeniceus (Rödvingetrupial)

Common, observed thirteen days.

# Brewer's Blackbird Euphagus cyanocephalus (Prärietrupial)

1 at pond north of Alpine 23/4.

#### Common Grackle Quiscalus quiscula (Mindre båtstjärt)

Common, especially on the Upper Texas Coast; observed seven days.

#### Boat-tailed Grackle Quiscalus major (Större båtstjärt)

Common, observed nine days.

#### Great-tailed Grackle Quiscalus mexicanus (Mexikobåtstjärt)

Very common, observed every day, except for in Big Bend NP 22/4.

#### Bullock's Oriole Icterus bullockii (Bullocktrupial)

2 on South Padre Island 18/4, 1 on South Padre Island 19/4 and 1 at Amistad Reservoir 21/4.

#### **Baltimore Oriole** *Icterus galbula* (Baltimoretrupial)

1 at CR 239 and 4 on South Padre Island 18/4, 1 on South Padre Island 19/4, 4, 7 and 12 respectively in the High Island area 25/4, 27/4 and 28/4.

#### **Hooded Oriole** *Icterus cucullatus* (Palmtrupial)

2 in Rockport Demo Bird Garden and 2 in Goose Island SP 16/4.

## Orchard Oriole Icterus spurius (Trädgårdstrupial)

Common, especially on the Upper Texas coast, observed eight days.

## Altamira Oriole *Icterus gularis* (Altamiratrupial)

1 at Quinta Matzlan and 2 at Santa Ana 20/4 and 7 at Salineno 21/4.

#### **Scott's Oriole** *Icterus parisorum* (Scotts trupial)

2 in Big Bend NP 22/4 and 1 at Lost Maples 24/4.

#### Audubon's Oriole Icterus Graduacauda (Audubontrupial)

1 at CR 239 18/4 and 1 at Lost Maples 24/4.

House Finch Carpodacus mexicanus (Husrosenfink)

3 at Amistad Reservoir 21/4, 1 in Big Bend NP 22/4, 3 at pond north of Alpine 23/4 and 7 in Utopia 24/4.

**Lesser Goldfinch** *Carduelis psaltria* (Småsiska) 3 in Pharr 20/4 and 1 in Utopia 24/4.

**House Sparrow** *Passer domesticus* (Gråsparv) Common, observed every day of the trip.
