Daily Log

11th Nov After a long flight from Stockholm, which started in the misty morning of the 10th, including a stopover in Istanbul, we reached Muscat International Airport in the early morning of the 11th, just a few of hours before sunrise. We tried to get some sleep on the cold concrete floor until the first light touched our eyes through the airport panorama windows. After a burger at DQ Grill & Chill we got some 30 minutes of birding from the second floor of the building, using only binoculars. The only *Indian Rollers* of the trip were observed, flying back and forth hunting insects above the airport strip. After some additional hours we finally went on a domestic flight towards Salalah in the south. Directly upon arrival we took a cab to the great Salalah Beach Villas to get some birdwatching before the too soon to come sunset. Immediately we felt as if we were at the very right place to be! A male *Desert Weathear*- by far the most widespread and common bird of the trip- greeted us just outside the hotel entrance. The fresh, salty and rather strong



breeze had brought a lot of feeding seabirds closer to the mainland, mainly *Sooty* and *Siberian Gulls, Swift* and *Lesser Crested Terns.* From the balcony we had great birdwatching towards the sea. Along the shoreline several waders such as *Kentish Plovers, Oystercatchers, Sanderlings* and *Terek Sandpipers* were seen. We felt ready for some hardcore-birding.

12th Nov Early morning outside Beach Villas with lots of seabirds passing by. One *Indian Pond Heron* and several *Graceful Prinias* were added to the trip list. After receiving our rental car, we went off towards East Khawr. In the southern part of the khawr hundreds of waders were foraging- it actually turned out to be the best numbers at this locality during the whole trip. Over 100 *Pacific Golden Plovers* were counted in, as well as several *Greater* and *Lesser Sand Plovers*, three *Broad-billed Sandpipers* etc. Later we found out that a *Caspian Plover* had been here this day, too bad we missed it. A mixed flock of



Whiskered and White-winged Black Terns were also present. A Short-toed Snake-Eagle flew by. We continued to Ayn Razat at the foothills of Dhofar Mountains. It is a small park and a nearby spring which is easily birded through during a couple of hours. Several African-Rock Buntings, a very nosey Little Green Bee-eater, Shining and Palestine Sunbirds and an adult Imperial Eagle were the highlights, but unfortunately no Bruce Green Pigeon which was the main target species. We spend the night outside Ras Mirbat, trying to sleep in our sleeping bags close to the car. Some four-footed creature woke us up in the humid night, sneaking around closeby, probably a Golden Jackal.

13th Nov Ras Mirbat in the morning hoping for some seabirds, but there was almost no wind at all. Despite this, we almost immediately discovered an *Antarctic Skua* slowly passing by towards east, a great surprise! We could also add some *Jouanin's Petrels*, *Brown Noddys* and *Persian Shearwaters*. Continued to Wadi Darbat, what a

nice vallev! There were dozens of Arabian Camels, Donkeys, Goats and Cattles grazing along the almost dry river bed. We spotted the



first out of in total two cameleons during the trip in a wooden area, which also held several African Paradise Flycatchers and a Nightingale of the subspecies golzii. A Lappet-faced Vulture was a great surprise, soaring high over the Wadi. Then continued to Tawi Atayr, the great sink hole, and twitched two individuals of a real speciality-Yemen Serin (which only can be found here, except Yemen). Construction work for a new hotel complex had started at Khawr Tagah, but it was at the time of our visit still good birding in the area closest to the beach. Thousands of gulls and terns on the sandy beaches, among these a Common Gull (only a few winter records per year in Oman). We also saw Purple Heron, Steppe Grey Shrike, Black Kite etc. From the paved road outside the fenced Sahnawt Farm we got our eyes on a flock of 60+ Sociable Lapwings, one of the trips greatest finds- rarely recorded in the southern part of the country and never in such numbers. Later on during the winter even more birds were counted here by other visiting birders.

14th Nov We started off at Ayn Hamran, the number one hotspot for Verreaux's Eagle. Despite hours of watching the cliffs no Verreaux's were found, but several other eagles. In the bushes and trees surrounding the parking lot *Arabian* and *Eastern Olivaceous Warbler* were added to the trip list. After leaving Ayn Hamran we saw a flock of more than 60 *Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouses* which came to drink for a short while



water-conduit at а leaching water. At Ayn Razat the first Bruce's Green Pigeon of the trip showed itself well at some fig trees inside the fenced area. Back to Salalah and after some guidance from some other birders we managed to see four Spotted Thick-knees just outside Hotel Crown Plaza, amazing birds! Went off to Ad Dahariz Park where two Crested Honey Buzzards were roosting. After an interesting

meeting with the "head of farms", we got permission to enter Jarziz Farm during midafternoon. *Isabelline Shrikes*, *Pallid Harriers*, *Ringnecked Parakeets* etc. showed well.

15th Nov Early by car towards Al Mughsayl in the west- a must for every birder going to southern Oman. We started off at the small natural ponds which can be reached by going north on a gravelly road west of the khawr. It turned out to be a perfect place to start a morning, watching *Baillon's Crakes* feeding just metres away without paying any notice whatsoever. A strange sound made us turn our heads turning the sky. A flock of 13 waders came flying in high up in the air from the northeast and were soon telescoped- *CRAB PLOVERS*! They continued southwards towards the ocean and we just stood there shocked looking at each other, definitely not a species we expected in this part of the country. Soon we



could also add White-breasted Waterhen, Night Heron and Malachite Kingfisher among the visitors to the pond. In the surroundings were several South Arabian Weathears, Citrine Wagtails and Mountain Buntings. Göran took a walk up the cliffs and found a flock of 15 Arabian Partridges which were soon telescoped by Tobias. A skulky warbler puzzled us a bit, feeding in overhanging bushes up in steep cliffs over one of the ponds. Eventually it flew down to the reeds and turned out to be a Clamorous Reed Warbler. On the way back towards the coast we spotted a falcon on a power line- a 1cy Amur Falcon! Shortly after that another Crested Honey Buzzard was seen, this time of an almost white phase. At the "Blow holes" the only Long-billed Pipit of the trip was seen and outside the nearby restaurant a Brown Booby roosted on a navigation mark out on the sea. In the late afternoon we started the long drive towards Salalah and then northwards into the endless desert. Close to Al Balid Farm we called it a stop, turned off the car and simply jumped into our sleeping bags on the flat sand banks.

16th **Nov** We woke up early due to the frosty desert morning. When sleeping out in nature in Salalah region, close to the ocean, the problem was the high humidity, in the desert the problem was, as expected, the opposite- it was freezing



cold! When the first sunrays started to warm our bodies a Pied Weathear welcomed us at the parking lot next to the farm. We started to walk around in between the small fields, ditches and plantations and soon found out that the desert farms in Oman was something quite special. Asian Koel, "Caspian Stonechat" (ssp. variegatus) and Yellow-browed Warbler were the highlights at this location. We also saw an Arabian Fat-tailed Scorpion and hundreds of Vagrant Emperors (Anax ephippiger). We continued deeper in to the central desert, the only sightings along the straight road were a few Hoopoe Larks and Brownnecked Ravens, respectively. We finally reached the Qitbit Motel- having a rather large garden which is frequently visited by birdwatchers- and birds. Almost immediately we spotted the young male Black-throated Trush which had been present in the garden for some time. We continued to walk around and soon spotted an Ortolan Bunting. A strange looking bunting caught our attention, but we just saw it very briefly before it disappeared. Either a pale Yellowhammer or a Pine Bunting, anyway a first for Oman! A 1 cy Brahminy Starling surprised us as well. We enjoyed a nice fish meal at the motel and looked forward for a morning in the garden!

17th **Nov** Some british birders had seen a Nile-Valley Sunbird in the garden the day before, so we started looking for this one. Soon we could hear the bird singing, moving fast high up in the trees. This species is usually rare in Oman, but we managed to see another one at the nearby Oitbit oasis later in the afternoon as well. Lots of activity of passerines in the early morning! We soon found the unidentified Emberiza from yesterday, now feeding together with the Ortolan and a male Little Bunting (!). It turned out to be a Pine Bunting and we got good photos of the bird. In the garden we spotted one of the highlights of the trip- a male Hypocolius! A female Red-tailed Weathear was also seen here. We went on towards the Qitbit Oasis, on the way there a Rüppels Sand Fox were seen passing by in the desert. At the oasis we got glimpses and heard a presumed Taiga Flycatcher. It was a male with a small distinct, orange throat-patch that was moving quickly in the bushes. After a visit in Nepal in 2011, listening to several calling "Taiga's", there's no doubt about the bird belonging to this species. We also saw and heard a skulky Dusky Warbler, another 1st for Oman, however found by the British birders as we were there. The oasis facilitated a natural spring, attracting thirsty Sandgrouses every morning at a specific time. We were right on time for the breakfast drink. Mainly Spotted Sandgrouses, but we also got nice views of a small flock of Crowned coming to drink. We went on to Dawkah New Farms which did not disappoint us. A flock of Rosy Starlings were accompanied by a male Namaqua Dove. On the grassy fields hundreds of Greater Short-toed Larks were present. Several Asian Desert Warblers were seen in the scrubs surrounding the fields and next to some abandoned greenhouses a female Ménétriés's Warbler was spotted. We moved on to a nearby field which was being watered and, naturally, gave a greener and more inviting impression. We saw a small flock of Sociable Lapwings together with Cream-Coloured



Coursers, a Richards Pipit and lots of Swallows and Wagtails.

In the evening we arrived to Thumrait, had a nice dinner and fell asleep in a hotel which could have been used as inspiration to the song "Hotel California".



18th Nov After a couple of hours we left the hotel and drove towards Wadi Rabkut, a dry Wadi stretching for several kilometers into the desert and the place in southern Oman to search for McQueens Bustard. A few hours later we found ourselves far into the wadi, with just some mouthfuls of water with us, as the sun started to really heat. We had seen a vulture sitting in a tree far away and simply started to move towards it while the sun still was rising, but now it went "all-vulcan-heat" on us. The vulture turned out to be a Lappet-faced and we also flushed some Lichtenstein's Sandgrouses and saw a couple of Desert Larks, but no Bustards... Better luck next time, right? We went back to Salalah and went straight to the sewage plant in Raysut. Hundreds of eagles, mainy Steppe Eagles, were almost overwhelming. Also Bonelli's, Imperial-, Greaterspotted and Booted Eagles were noted here. Our DSLR's went warm. Overall, the great number of raptors of different species observed during our time in Oman surprised us. In the ponds several waders such as Black-winged stilts, Wood Sandpipers and Common Sandpipers were feeding in numbers. Also, we managed to spot four Redwattled and one Spur-winged Lapwing, both species

rather scarce in the Salalah region. We continued to West Khawr where an *Intermediate Egret* and a *Cotton Teal* were new species of the trip. The day ended at the unpredictable East Khawr and this time we were awarded with a *Pheasant-tailed Jacana*. We welcomed the night at Ayn Hamran where three *African Scops Owl* called frequently after dusk.

19th Nov Woke up in the car just before sunrise and started birding the surroundings. Good views of Arabian Warblers but still no "King of the Dhofar mountains" in the sky. Afternoon we moved slowly towards the east. A stop at Khawr Taqah gave nothing new, except for a nice bath in the warm ocean (watching Barracudas, Dolphins and jumping Stingrays not far out!).

At Ras Janjari we saw several *Jounanin's Petrels* and *Persian Shearwaters*, as well as a few *Pale-footed Shearwaters* and *Masked Boobys*. Also, a *Pomarine*, a couple of *Arctic Sknas*, *Brown noddys* and *Bridled Terns* passed by. Just before sunset we spotted two canines on a slope a few hundred metres away from the car, far away from any village. They were tall, large and looked healthy (compared to the wild domestic dogs running

around the outskirts of Salalah, which represented the opposite attributes). Were they only an unusual couple of identical and wolf-like dogs or could it in fact have been Arabian Wolves? 20th Nov Morning at Wadi Darbat and again looking for the main target species for the moment, Verreaux's Eagle. Among a flock of White Storks we found a Black Stork, a scarce visitor to Oman. We left the area, again without an experience of the much sought after eagle. The day before we had met some birders that said they had observed an Abdim's Stork at Ras Mirbat, so we headed towards the small fishing

village. We scanned the air above the town and suddenly an Abdim's Stork appeared. And another....and another... Altogether 69(!) Abdim's were seen together at the outskirts of

the village, attracted by the corps of a dead goat. At the small harbor the smell of rotten fish (?) was unbearable, but hundreds of *Sooty* and *Steppe* Gulls roosted and offered great vies. Went on to Khawr Taqah followed by Ayn Hamran and now, finally, an impressive Verreaux's Eagle showed up and landed on a cliff! It was soon joined by another one, a younger individual, and they made some nice acrobatics in the air together straight above us before gliding towards south. We went on to East Khawr, this time two Little Prantincoles sat on the sandbanks close to beach track.

21st Nov This day we chilled out, after all, it was the last day of the trip! Calm morning at Ayn Hamran and then we continued to Raysut, but without any new sightings. In the afternoon we summarized and left our rental car at the hotel, caught a cab and headed towards Salalah Airport. All in all we saw more than 219 species. One thing is for sure; however, whenever we want some laidback-birding with with a great variety of species and good chances for surprising findings, we'll just grab a last minute flight to Salalah! And, actually, that time is coming soon again!
