# Southern India, February 25<sup>th</sup> to March 13<sup>th</sup> 2003

## Front page

Great Indian Bustard, *Ardeotis nigriceps*, north-west of Rollapadu, Andra Pradesh, February 27<sup>th</sup>, increasingly rare and now critically endangered, known from just a few sanctuaries. One of three birds seen. Most oftenly observed at Desert NP, Rajastan, NW India.

## **Highlights**

- Spotting a Lesser Florican at Rollapadu! Truely one of Indias most elusive and seldom-seen species.
- A royal party of three magnificent Great Indian Bustards west of Rollapadu.
- The impressive harrier-roost at Rollapadu where 300 Montagu's and Pallid gathered at sunset.
- Flocks of buntings at Rollapadu; Black-headed, Red-headed and best of all Grey-necked.
- The cute endemic Black-and-orange Flycatcher at Ooty.
- Shola-birding at Cairnhill Forest with endangered Black-chinned Laughingthrush, Nilgiri Blue Robin and Thrush.
- Three Tawny Eagles soaring at Masinagudi.
- Scrambling our way upward from the Jungle Hut and finally rewarded with Nilgiri Pipit at the summit.
- A scarce Gaur running away above Jungle Hut.
- A roadside early-morning black-eyed Spot-bellied Eagle-Owl near Theppakadu.
- Indian Pittas, Indian Blue Robins and Orange-headed Thrushes in dried river beds around Masinagudi.
- · Bamboo-bound cool-looking Grey-headed Bulbul at Nadugani.
- Natarajan finding a day-roosting Sri Lanka Frogmouth at Top Slip.
- Black-headed male Malabar Trogon at Top Slip.
- Night-walk at Top Slip with Common Hawk Cuckoo 'brain-fever'ing, and lots of calling nightjars and owls.

## Introduction

The Western Ghats is home to many endemic birds and offers many fantastic birding experiences. We made a 16 day trip and included seldom-visited Rollapadu in Andra Pradesh to our itinerary since it seemed to be a fair chance of seeing Great Indian Bustard there. On general notice southern India differs a lot culturally from the northern parts of India. People are very friendly and helpful, and travelling independently was often easy. Our budget was restricted to 10 USD per person/day and most days this was more than enough. These two weeks in southern India was part of a longer trip to Asia. We arrived at Hyderabad from Delhi after three weeks in the north. After Coimbatore we continued to Mumbai and then to Bangkok.

## Itinerary

- 25.2: Arrival late evening at Hyderabad Airport from Delhi. Night-train to Kurnool.
- 26.2: Rollapadu, arriving early morning from Kurnool via Nandikotkur.
- 27.2: Rollapadu.
- 28.2: Rollapadu until mid-day, transport to Bangalore (night-bus).
- 1.3: Bangalore, night-bus to Ooty.
- 2.3: Ooty, arriving early morning. Birding Botanical Gardens and Potatoe Research Station.
- 3.3: Ooty, Cairnhill Forest. Transport during afternoon to Masinagudi arriving at evening.
- 4.3: Masinagudi, Jungle Hut.
- 5.3: Masinagudi, Sighur River and the Dam.
- 6.3: Masinagudi, climbing the Nilgiris from Jungle Hut.
- 7.3: Masinagudi, around the town and the Dam.
- 8.3: Theppakadu, during the morning. Transport to Nadugani, arriving at noon, night at Gudalur.
- 9.3: Nadugani, birding during the day, night at Gudalur.
- 10.3: Transport from Gudalur to Pollachi via Ooty and Coimbatore, night at Pollachi.
- 11.3: Getting permit for Top Slip at Pollachi during the morning. Arriving Top Slip at noon.
- 12.3: Top Slip.
- 13.3: Top Slip during the morning, transport to Coimbatore via Pollachi. Flight to Mumbai.

## Site info including accommodation and transport (in chronological order)

### Rollapadu

About Rollapadu you need to know two things, firstly you need a permit to stay at the education centre at Rollapadu. This permit can be obtained from the Forest Office in Nandikotkur. We didn't get a permit and had guite some hassle at Rollapadu. Luckily one of the officers from Nandikotkur had planned a trip to Rollapadu, and we ran into him on our arrival day and organized accommodation and permit at site. The advice to future visitors would be to get the permit at Nandikotkur to save some trouble. The second thing is that there are absolutely no food or water what so ever to be bought at Rollapadu! So you need to carry everything with you from Nandikotkur. We didn't know this before, so we had to take the bus back and forth to get some supplies. And you do need a lot of water, because it gets really hot during the days. About the birding then. The actual reserve is north of the nature centre, and there is a small watching tower close to a temple. From this watching tower there is quite a good view. We found the female Lesser Florican from this tower. The grasslands north of the nature centre are also where the magnificent harrier roost is. Just after dusk hundreds of harriers gather here to spend the nights together on the ground, that's very impressive. Nearby the nature centre there was a water pump which gathered nice amounts of larks and pipits (e.g. Sykes's Lark). Another great area was the Talamudipi Tank one km east of Rollapadu. From the tank we walked back westward through the scrub, where we found Grey-necked Bunting and Indian Bushlark. The main target of our staying here was off course the Great Indian Bustard. After discussing with the local guides, we realized that there were no Bustards on the reserve at the moment, but they knew a place north-west of Rollapadu where there might still be some birds around. At evening-time we arranged for a jeep and a guide (S. Jampa) from the nature centre. After half an hours driving the guide suddenly shouted stop and pointed out something just behind some bushes some hundred meters away, and there where three giant Great Indian Bustard, two males and one female. The Jeep cost us something like 800 R including petrol, and the guide 100 R.

<u>Transport</u>: Took an auto-rickshaw from Kurnool train station to Kurnool bus station for 40 R, then bus to Nandikuthor 21 R /p then bus from Nandikotkur to Rollapadu 10 R /p.

Accommodation: We stayed at the Nature Education Centre 150 R /2p.

<u>Best birds seen</u>: Great Indian Bustard, Lesser Florican, Demoiselle Crane, River Tern, Small Pratincole, Indian Courser, Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouse, great numbers of harriers, Indian Spotted Eagle, Sykes's Lark, Yellow-billed Babbler, Grey-necked, Red-headed and Black-headed Buntings.

Others have seen: Painted Francolin, Rock Bush-quail, Pied Harrier.

### Ooty

A nice climate brings lots of people to this former Hill station named Udhagamandalam or Ootacamund (which is shortened to Ooty). The best birding is mainly three places: The Botanical Gardens, the Potato Research station and Cairnhill Forest. All birds we saw at the Botanical Gardens (entry fee: 25 R/p) were seen elsewhere, so it's not essential for the itinerary. The Potato Research Station is said to be the best place for Nilgiri Wood Pigeon which we dipped out on, quite a disappointing place with few birds around. Cairnhill Forest is on the other hand very good, and essential for a good list of Western Ghat specialities. No Kashmir Flycatcher was seen, maybe it was a bit late in the season. The maps in Kazmierczak & Singh is good enough to understand where to go. Transport: Bus from Bangalore to Ooty 182 R /p.

<u>Accommodation</u>: The recommended Reflections Guesthouse 250 /2p, which was a really nice place. <u>Best birds seen</u>: Tickell's Leaf Warbler, Large-billed Leaf Warbler, Western Crowned Warbler, Nilgiri Flycatcher, Black-and-orange Flycatcher, Nilgiri Blue Robin, Indian Scimitar Babbler, Indian Blue Robin. Black-chinned Laughingthrush, Nilgiri Thrush, Black-headed Cuckooshrike.

<u>Others have seen</u>: Kashmir Flycatcher is said to be a rare but regular winter guest at Cairnhill Forest, Nilgiri Wood Pigeon at the Potato Research station, Painted Bush-quail, Brown Wood Owl, Forest Wagtail.

### Masinagudi

#### The Dam and around the town

Masinagudi is a small village just east of the large Mudumalai reserve. Within the reserve the birding possibilities are restricted during our staying the reserve was closed due to dry condition and risks of forest fires as well as

aggressive thirsty elephants. Northeast of the small town there is a water dam which naturally attracts birds. There are some nice bamboo thickets here as well.

<u>Best birds seen</u>: Red Spurfowl, Woolly-necked Stork 8, White-rumped Vulture 3, Tawny Eagle 3, Stork-billed Kingfisher, White-naped Woodpecker, Indian Pitta, Clamorous Reed Warbler, Thick-billed Warbler, Booted Warbler, Hume's Whitethroat.

#### Jungle Hut

South of Masinagudi there is an excellent guest house called Jungle Hut, if our budget had been a bit larger we had for sure chosen the Jungle Hut, it compounds are great birding areas, with Orange-headed Thrush, Indian Blue Robin and Indian Pitta not uncommonly seen. We spent one whole day of birding around the Jungle Hut. <u>Best birds seen</u>: Blue-winged Parakeet, Malabar Grey Hornbill, Yellow-browed Bulbul, Indian Blue Robin, Orange-headed Thrush, Indian Pitta, Brown Fish-Owl, Malabar Starling, Malabar Woodshrike, Hill Swallow, Changeable Hawk-Eagle.

<u>Others have seen</u>: Sirkeer Malkoha, Grey-bellied Cuckoo, Jerdon's Nightjar, Loten's Sunbird, Indian Spotted Creeper.


#### Sighur River

This is the place for the White-bellied Minivet which we dipped out on. Also a reasonable chance of seeing Indian Elephants. We were dropped off at the the river crossing and picked up at the same place in the afternoon. On the way back to Masinagudi we stopped at the church close to Mavanhalla where we found Malabar Crested Lark and two Yellow-wattled Lapwings. The Sighur River was almost dried out, and we could easily walk in the river bed. After the morning hours it became really hot and the birding was slow. We found lots of fresh elephant droppings and at some point there was a lot of noise and trees were cracked in the forest above us, although we didn't see anything we do believe there were a few elephants there...

<u>Best birds seen</u>: Bonelli's Eagle, Black Eagle, Short-toed Snake Eagle, Indian Pitta, Indian Blue Robin, Malabar Whistling Thrush, Orange-headed Thrush, Blue-faced Malkoha,

<u>Others have seen</u>: White-bellied Minivet and Painted Bush-quail (on the road to Ooty at dawn) is the main target, Grey-headed Bulbul is possible.

#### Climbing the Nilgiris

On our first visit to the Jungle Hut we were amazed by the nice-looking mountains above the slopes to the south. After talking to the owner of Jungle Hut we decided to try to climb one of the peaks. We arranged for a guide showing us the path going uphill during the early morning. After many hours of climbing, along a small track through dry forest and later on through a small shola close to a little stream and then on to a larger track, we reached higher grounds. Just before the little stream we saw a Gaur running away on the right-hand side.

The larger track soon went through large tea plantations covering the slopes. We left the main track and searched our way through the tea plantations further uphill on the right-hand side. Finally we reached above the plantation on to grassy hill slopes until we reached a summit with great views of the surrounding peaks and distant dry forests of the Mudumalai Reserve. At the very top of the grassy hill we amazingly found a few Nilgiri Pipits. This species is endemic to the Western Ghats and most people twitch it at Munnar. We guess the Nilgiri Pipit is more widespread than the guides suggest. Reaching these high grassy hills is not a part of the regular Southern India itineraries we've read in other trip-reports. Probably more interesting birds could be found here. Best birds seen: Blue-faced Malkoha 1, Tawny-bellied Babbler, Malabar Lark (on the summit), Nilgiri Pipit 5 (summit), Blue-capped Rock Thrush 2 f, Black-and-orange Flycatcher 1 f, Asian Brown Flycatcher 8, Rusty-tailed Flycatcher 1, Verditer Flycatcher 3, Indian Black-lored Tit, Peregrine Falcon 1.

#### Theppakadu

The last day at Mudumalai we tried the dry river beds of Theppakadu for some morning birding before we headed on towards Nadugani. Together with Israeli birder Dubi Shapiro whom we met at Masinagudi the previous day we shared a pre-dawn jeep taxi from Masinagudi, along the way we were fortunate enough to spot a magnificent Spot-bellied Eagle-Owl from the jeep. We searched for Grey-headed Bulbul at Theppakadu without any luck, and were told not to take caution and not to leave the road due to the presence of thirsty potentially angry elephants.

Best birds seen: White-rumped Vulture, Spot-bellied Eagle-Owl, Blue-bearded Bee-eater, White-naped Woodpecker, Rufous Woodpecker, Indian Scimitar Babbler, Asian Brown Flycatcher, Malabar Whistling Thrush. <u>Others have seen</u>: Grey-headed Bulbul is the main target, Rufous Babbler in the bamboo thickets. <u>Transport</u>: Bus Ooty-Masinagudi 85 R /p. Jeep taxi Masinagudi-Jungle Hut-Masinagudi 100 or 130 R. Jeep taxi Masinagudi-Sighur River-Masinagudi 200 R. Jeep taxi Masinagudi-Theppakadu c. 50 R. <u>Accommodation</u>: .COM Guest House at the eastern outskirt of Masinagudi. A clean and newly built Guest House for 200 R /2p.

#### Nadugani

We were told buy a guide at Jungle Hut, Masinagudi that Top Slip was closed due to dry conditions, so we were suggested to try Nadugani for many of the same species. After reading Kazmierczak & Singh, Nadugani seemed to be an interesting place where very few birders go. On our last day at Masinagudi we met an Israeli birder who had previously been to Top Slip, so we decided to after all try for Top Slip following our visit to Nadugani. One problem with Nadugani is that it is difficult to find accommodation, which forced us back to Gudalur to find a cheaper room. Birding at Nadugani seemed quite hard. We never found the watchman's hut mentioned in Kazmierczak & Singh so all birding were made roadside. Most Indians who passed us seemed amused seeing two young Swedes carrying binoculars, and if they did not stay for a quick (or not so quick...) chat they horned at us. The early morning we spend at Nadugani was on the other hand extremely exciting since the road still was quite empty until later in the morning and bird activity was on its top. We had one marvellous bird-party with hundreds of birds including many *Phylloscopus*-warblers.

<u>Transport</u>: Cheap bus from Theppakadu to Gudalur and then from Gudalur to Nadugani. Took a rickshaw from Nadugani to the forest 5 km past Nadugani on the way to Nilambur in Kerala.

Accommodation: Venus Hotel in Gudalur 175 R /2p

<u>Best birds seen</u>: Malabar Barbet, Grey-headed Bulbul, Blue-capped Rock-thrush 1 m, Dark-fronted Babbler, Crimson-backed Sunbird, Indian Golden Oriole, Black Eagle, Rufous-bellied Eagle, Booted Eagle, Grey-fronted Green Pigeon, Brown-backed Needletail, Heart-spotted Woodpecker, Malabar Whistling Thrush, Thick-billed Warbler, Green Warbler, Rusty-tailed Flycatcher, White-bellied Blue Flycatcher.

<u>Others have seen</u>: Nilgiri Wood Pigeon, Malabar Trogon, Great Hornbill, White-bellied Treepie, Rufous Babbler, Wynaad Laughingthrush.

### Top Slip

When going to Top Slip it is mandatory to get a permit at the Forest Department in Pollachi. We had some serious trouble getting a permit since we were told that the park was closed due to dry weather. We had to stay over night in Pollachi and when we got to the Forest Department the second day we finally got our permit after the Warden Officer said ok. From Pollachi there is a one hour bus journey to Top Slip. At Top Slip it is essential

to arrange with the famous guide Natarajan to be able to find many of the species. He wasn't available when we arrived but on the second day we arranged a tour with him. After an hour or so, he skilfully found a perched Sri Lanka Frogmouth of which we got amazing views. It's probably impossible to find the Frogmouth without Natarajans help. During one night we did a small tour with a torch-light along the road to Parambikulam searching for Owls and Nightjars. We heard Jerdon's Nightjar and Oriental Scops Owl and did get great views of a Brown Hawk Owl. We found Top Slip excellent for many difficult species but the birding was rather slow from time to time.

#### Transport: Bus Pollachi-Top Slip c.15 R /p

Accommodation: Bison Lodge at the Top Slip nature centre 150 R /2p.

<u>Best birds seen</u>: Grey-fronted Green Pigeon, Blue-faced Malkoha, Common Hawk Cuckoo, Malabar Barbet, White-naped Woodpecker, Heart-spotted Woodpecker, Indian Pitta, Thick-billed Warbler, Orange-headed Thrush, White-bellied Treepie, Little Spiderhunter, Brown Hawk Owl, Sri Lanka Frogmouth, Malabar Trogon, Rufous Babbler, White-bellied Blue Flycatcher, Jerdon's Nightjar, Great-eared Nightjar, Forest Wagtail, Wynaad Laughingthrush.

<u>Others have seen</u>: White-bellied Woodpecker, Common Flameback, Black-throated Munia, White-rumped Spinetail, Chestnut-winged Cuckoo.

## Notes on a few endemics/difficult birds not seen during the trip

Rock Bush-quail: Possible at Rollapadu.

*Painted Bush-quail*: Along the road between Ooty and Masinagudi (Kalhatty). Endemic to South India. *Nilgiri Wood-Pigeon*: Best chance seems to be Munnar (Rajamalai), also possible at Ooty. Endemic to WG. *Sri Lanka Bay Owl*: Thattekad. Endemic to WG and SL.

White-bellied Woodpecker: Top Slip.

Chestnut-winged Cuckoo: Winter guest. Top Slip

White-bellied Minivet: Sighur River, Masinagudi. Endemic to S and W India.

Yellow-throated Bulbul: Bodi Ghat. Endemic to Western Ghats.

White-bellied Blue Robin: Periyar. Endemic to Western Ghats.

Kerala Laughingthrush: Rajamalai. Endemic to Western Ghats.

*Broad-tailed Grassbird*: Periyar. Endemic to Western Ghats. Apparantly difficult outside breeding season. *Black-throated Munia*: Top Slip. Endemic to WG and SL.

Tytler's Leaf Warbler: Winter-guest from Kashmir. We had one provisional bird above Jungle Hut-Masinagudi






