- Eventually a pair of Fruithunters on Mempening.
- Blue-banded Pitta and Hose's Broadbill at Poring Hot Springs, what a day!
- Pygmy White-eye carrying nesting material at Mile36 Lodge.
- Whitehead's Spiderhunter and Long-tailed Broadbill at Gunung Alab.

Logistics – Planning the trip – Future aspects

One of the classic birding destinations in Asia. With a well-developed infrastructure for ecotourism it's really easy to do Sabah independently. We used pretty much a standard itinerary only adding Klias, on the other hand we had to exclude a visit to any small islet, Mantanani seeming the most interesting alternative. We used domestic flights between KK and Sandakan and between Lahad Datu and KK. If arriving (as we did) via Kuala Lumpur one could also investigate the possibility to fly directly from KL to Sandakan, an alternative we learned too late. After discussions with fellow birders in Sweden who had been to Sabah we soon opted for hiring a car for the Kinabalu-leg of the trip. Another option worth thinking about is to rent a car in KK at arrival, do Kinabalu, proceed to Sandakan (Sepilok/Kinabatang) and on to Danum before returning the car at Lahad Datu (for a fee) and take the flight back to KK. The road quality was pretty decent, traffic mostly sparse and it sure made Kinabalu easier to tackle so we would gladly recommend using a rental car. Klias was added late to the program after airline time changes which forced us to leave Sweden one day earlier giving us an extra morning (in retrospect, a blissing).

Itinerary

28.3 **KK – Klias**: Late arrival at KK 18.25, got our rental car and drove south 2h to Beaufort. Night at River Park Hotel, Beaufort.

- 29.3 **Klias Sepilok**: Klias Peat Swamp Forest Reserve 05.30-11.00. Drove back 2h to KKIA with brief stops for waders just north of Kinarut. Flight KK at 15.00 arrival at Sandakan 15.50. Took a cab 25 min to Sepilok B&B. Walked the entrance road and birded Sepilok RDC 16.30 to 20.15 including some nightwalking. Night at Sepilok B&B.
- 30.3 **Sepilok Kinabatang**: Birded Sepilok RDC 05.30 to 11.00. Pickup at Sepilok B&B at 13.00. Drove 2h to the Kinabatang river jetty at Bilit and took a 15 min long-boat ride through a torrential rainfall to Kinabatang Jungle Camp. Afternoon birding trip on the main river and Sungai Tenegang 16.00-18.15 and a shorter ride to the same area for nightbirds 20.30- 22.00. Night at KJC.
- 31.3 **Kinabatang Gomantong**: Morning birding at Sungai Mananggol. Lunch at KJC and a short walk on the camp trail. Afternoon trip to Gomantong Caves, stayed until dark when different raptors ambushed the bats. Tried again for nightbirds at Sungai Tenegang 20.30-21.30. Night at KJC.
- 1.4 **Kinabatang**: Morning birding along the main river and at Mananggol. Lunch at KJC, walked the camp trail. Afternoon along the main river upstream from Bilit. Night at KJC.
- 2.4 **Kinabatang DVFC**: Morning birding at Sungai Mananggol. Left KJC midday, drop-off at the Sandakan-Lahad Datu junction, from there a taxi (no AC!) to DVFC office in Lahad Datu (2h15min from KJC to Lahad Datu). Late lunch at Lahad Datu. 4WD transport from Lahad Datu to DVFC (1h45min). Birding River trail 16.45-18.15. Evening nightwalk along East trail. Night at DVFC.
- 3.4 **DVFC**: Morning birding around DVFC along the entrance road. After breakfast birding the grid to W12 and back. After lunch birding the grid to W0N5 \rightarrow W10N5 \rightarrow W10 and back. Heavy downpour in the

evening prevented any nightwalking. Night at DVFC.

- 4.4 **DVFC**: Morning around the campsite and DVFC. After breakfast full day walking the Rhino Ridge with packed lunch, took around 9 hours. Late evening nightwalk on East trail. Night at DVFC.
- 5.4 **DVFC**: Morning on the Nature trail. After breakfast full day walking the Tembaling Waterfall trail with packed lunch. Back at 15.00, Birded East trail in the late afternoon. Late evening nightwalk on East and Orchid trails and on the grid to W9 and back. Night at DVFC.
- 6.4 **DVFC**: Morning at start of the grid. After breakfast full day walking the grid with packed lunch. Walked to $W25 \rightarrow W15 \rightarrow W15S5 \rightarrow W0$. Late afternoon along the entrance road 16.30-18.30. Late evening night-walk the grid to W8 and back and Orchid and East trail. Night at DVFC.
- 7.4 **DVFC Kinabalu**: Morning at the tree platform on the Nature trail 06.30-07.50. After breakfast birding Orchid and East trail and around DVFC until 11.15. Left DVFC with 4WD after lunch. Afternoon flight from Lahad Datu to KK 16.00-16.55. Picked up our rental car from Europcar and drove to Mile36 Lodge just outside Kinabalu Park, arrived after dark. Night at Mile36 Lodge.
- 8.4 Kinabalu: Morning birding around Mile36 Lodge. 15 min drive to Timpohon gate. Walked Bukit Ular → Mempening → Lower Liwagu → HQ → Pandanus → Upper Kiau View → Silau-Silau → HQ. Taxi (16 RM) to Timpohon gate to pick up our car. Night at Mile36 Lodge.
- 9.4 **Kinabalu**: Morning birding on Bukit Ular 06.00-07.15. Summit trail to Layang-Layang, back at Timpohon at 13.00. Heavy afternoon downpour 14.00-15.00. Birded Lower Kiau View and Pandanus in the late afternoon. Night at Mile36 Lodge.
- 10.4 **Poring Hot Springs**: Left Mile36 at around 04.15. Arrived at PHS around 40 mins later. Walked the Langanan Waterfall trail from 05.00, passed the bat cave while still dark. Birded full day with a packed lunch (from a restaurant at Kinabalu) along the waterfall trail. A short late afternoon downpour. Back at PHS around 17.30. Drove back to Kinabalu park. Night at Mile36 Lodge.
- 11.4 Kinabalu: Morning birding on Bukit Ular 05.40-06.45. Walked Silau-Silau → Pandanus → Upper Kiau View. After lunch walked Upper Mempening → road → Upper Silau-Silau → Lower Mempening → Lower Liwagu → Lower Silau-Silau. Night at Mile36 Lodge.
- 12.4 **Kinabalu Gunung Alab**: Morning birding at Bukit Ular 05.40-07.45. After buying breakfast at the Timpohon gate we realized someone had smashed one of the rear windows on the passenger side on the car and stolen two of our backpacks including wallets, homekeys, one Canon camera with a 300 mm lens and one passport! Drove in panic back to Mile36, used the WiFi to block our credit cards. Contacted the Swedish Embassy in Malaysia (KL) and the Tourist Police. Checked out from Mile36. The police escorted us to the Police Station in Ranau to fill in a formal police report (took 2h). Drove to Tambunan (1h), dropped our (remaining!) stuff in our room at Tambunan Inn. Drove to Rafflesia Information Center at Gunung Alab (25min). Birded RIC 15.00-17.15. Night at Tambunan Inn.
- 13.4 **Gunung Alab KK**: A few short stops around RIC between 06.15-07.00. Drove to KKIA and settled the rental car. Visited the Swedish Honorary Consulate and the Department of Immigration. Late afternoon flight to KL where Henrik where forced to stay until the following day to get a new temporary passport from the Swedish Embassy. Måns and Mathias continued to Doha and Sweden and arrived early next day. Henrik was back in Sweden the following day.




Chestnut-necklaced Partridge, The Grid at night, DVFC.

Map of Sabah




Birding Localities - Strategy

Klias Peat Swamp Forest Reserve

This reserve has just recently attracted attention from the birding scene and it's easy to see why. The habitat is peat swamp forest on poor soils, a habitat you won't encounter on any of the other regular Sabah birding spots. And as unique the habitat is, as is the birdlife. The main target is usually the rare Hook-billed Bulbul which is a practical endemic to Borneo since its occurance on Sumatra is well beyond any beaten track. But the list could be made longer, on our visit we found Grey-breasted Babbler just next to the boardwalk immidiately close to the observation tower at the far end of the boardwalk, this bird is known from Klias but very rarely seen, and another bird found only in peat swamp forest. The bird was hopping around 1-2 m above ground in a typical babbler manner and we got close views but too brief and too much branches for any photos. The grey breast-band was very striking as well as the distinct head pattern. There are also two Flowerpeckers sought-after, the beauty one is the Scarlet-breasted and the ugly one is the Brown-backed, both highly localized. There is a large parking lot at the Field Center (http://www.mysabah.com/wordpress/klias-peat-swamp-field-center/) and there is no gate, the start of the boardwalk is not marked but easy to find, just walk right through the complex. We arrived before dawn and there were a few Large-tailed Nightjars hawking around.

<u>Accommodation</u>: River Park Hotel, Beaufort (178 RM/3p). Tel 087 223 333, Fax 087 223 388. No internet booking possible. We just showed up, didn't seem crowded. The hotel restaurant had closed when we arrived so we walked across the bridge and had dinner at mega-tasty KFC.

<u>Strategy</u>: We only had one morning to spare. Our suggestion is to walk quite fast past the first half of the boardwalk through the scrubby secondary regrowth and focus all your time at the far end triangle of the boardwalk where the primary forest starts, here we practically saw all of the good birds. Unfortunately we spent too much time at the start of the boardwalk and lost at least an hour which would have been better spent at the far end where the bulbul usually stakes out. When we left at 11 AM it was hot and quiet.



Other birds not encountered elsewhere on our trip included: Red-crowned Barbet, Cinnamon-headed Green Pigeon, Bar-bellied Cuckooshrike and Black-throated Babbler.


Klias Peat Swamp Forest Reserve, SW of Beaufort. The blue markings indicates the well-managed and easy-birded boardwalk.

Sepilok Rainforest Discovery Center

We really enjoyed our short stay at Sepilok. It's not essential to go to Sepilok for any particular species, as most (all) birds are shared with Kinabatang and Danum Valley. But the canopy walkway and well-managed trail system is really worth a visit. The canopy walkway is nothing less than breathtaking. Its a powerful steel construction and includes two high towers.

<u>Accommodation</u>: Sepilok B&B (http://www.sepilokbednbreakfast.com.my/), we stayed in the Hornbill Lodge, 143 RM/3p. Booking was done before via mail. Dinner was served 6-9 PM. WiFi present. Recommendable. <u>Strategy</u>: Don't forget the flowery bushes along the entrance road just before the ticket booth, this is the only place were we encountered Copper-throated Sunbirds. We spent almost all birding time on the canopy walkway and used both the Bristlehead tower and the Trogon tower. We stayed in the Bristlehead tower way after dark in hope of spotting or hearing Barred Eagle-Owl but no luck, only a Sunda Scops-Owl calling. A short nightwalk along the Kingfisher trail was productive with one Slow Loris and one Colugo. We were back the following morning before sunrise and had one Rufous-collared Kingfisher calling just at the start of the canopy walkway. No Bristleheads were encountered. Sepilok is definitely worth a visit, in retrospect we're happy with the time spent, one half day would have been too short, maybe we would have liked at least another half day to be able to explore the trails better.

<u>Other birds not encountered elsewhere on our trip included</u>: Blue-throated Bee-eater, Blue-rumped Parrot, Large Woodshrike, Streaked Bulbul, Yellow-vented Flowerpecker.


Lower Kinabatang River

Famous for the best place to see the enigmatic Bornean Ground Cuckoo. As most birders we contacted Robert Chong, founder of Kinabatang Jungle Camp, early on, and booked him for a three night stay including a visit to Gomantong. Birding on Kinabatang is very different from the rest of the itinerary. Since all birding is done from a boat: Its passive, and its very hard to affect the outcome. There are four "monsters" that all birders look for, these are: The Ground Cuckoo, Giant Pitta, Oriental Bay Owl and White-crowned Hornbill. Of these we only heard the hornbill calling, pretty disappointing actually. Not that we didn't worked for it. We played the tapes at all known Cuckoo-sites a couple of hundred times... In the end it's a matter of luck/karma. The boattrips are mornings and late afternoons, with a long siesta in the middle of the day. We also made 2 night trips for owls. Activity drops rapidly in the mornings and by 9AM it was usually dead silent. The upside was great views of Storm's Stork, all nice kingfishers (unfortunately non-responsive Ruddy Kingfishers), many raptors (12 species!) and fantastic mammal watching: Outrageous Proboscis Monkeys, Bornean Orangutans, Elephants, Civet, Pigs. From the KJC camp area there is a loop trail that we explored on two different lunch breaks, Scarlet-rumped Trogon was probably the best bird seen. A few minutes from the jetty at Bilit at a slope on a nearby ridge there was a Green Broadbill territory, we heard that bird on a short stop on the way to Gomantong. Oriental Bay Owl is mostly searched for along the Sungai Tenegang, where it sometimes can be found close to the plantations where it apparantly hunts for rats. Large Frogmouth is in the same area.

<u>Accommodation</u>: Kinabatang Jungle Camp (<u>www.kinabatang-jungle-camp.com</u>, <u>kjcjunglecamp@yahoo.com.my</u>) (Robert Chong: +60143729552). We had a three night full board package including transports (pickup Sepilok, drop-off Sandakan-Lahad Datu junction) for 1680 RM pp. Food was excellent.

<u>Strategy</u>: On all boattrips we were joined by Robert and also Romsi, Roberts successor as the main bird guide in the area. Romsi have been working with Robert for the last couple of years and is a good birdwatcher. Especially observant when it comes to bird calls. So if Robert can't join you, Romsi is (at least) as good as a guide. Some of the bird tour companys go for only two nights, and for some reason always (Birdtour Asia...) seems to get the Cuckoo, to increase your chances, three nights are advisable. We found Sungai Mananggol being the most interesting area, it's a narrow creek and generally good for smaller birds early in the morning. The main river is great for hornbills and raptors but too noisy and sometimes too crowded with other tourists for most passerines.


<u>Other birds not encountered elsewhere on our trip included</u>: Jerdon's Baza (one of the best places in the world for this widespread but scarce Asian species?), Lesser and Grey-headed Fish Eagle, Black-bellied Malkoha, Moustached Hawk-Cuckoo, Wrinkled Hornbill.

Gomantong Caves

Publicly famous for bats, and the seasonal harvest of swiftlet nests. The park is open from 08.00 to 18.00. The entrance fee in 30 RM pp plus additional 30 RM per camera(!). Between the bats, the centipedes and the cockroaches there are echo-locating swiftlets nesting, the majority being Black-nest Swiftlets, during our brief visit we found only a few Edible-nest Swiftlets but unfortunately no Mossy-nests. Out of season? Most birders opt for the obvious highlight when the thousands of bats leave the cave at dusk. We had at least three Bat Hawks, one Blyth's Hawk-Eagle and one Peregrine Falcon ambushing the flocks. Along the well-maintained boardwalk we had a female Orangutan and her cub and great views of both Hooded and Black-crowned Pittas. <u>Strategy</u>: We arrived around 16.00 and left 18.10, a fine afternoon excursion from KJC, it felt like a good break from the passive boat-sitting. Many groups visit Gomantong on their way to or from KJC to avoid the "double" drive. In retrospect we would have liked to arrive at least an hour earlier to be able to bird along the paved approach road, although at 15.00 its probably very low activity. Maybe one should consider a morning visit instead. Upon arrival our suggestion is to be dropped off halfway to the park entrance and walk the last kilometer, something we regret we didn't.


Danum Valley Field Center

Primary rainforest at its very best. In stark contrast to the never-ending oil palm plantions of Sabah the huge Danum Valley conservation area stretches 438 square kilometers, there are two alternatives for accommodation. Firstly the apparantly luxurious Borneo Rainforest Lodge (BRL), and secondly the less so Danum Valley Field Center (DVFC).

Accommodation: We contacted DVFC via wongrichel@yahoo.com and booked a full-board 5 night package. As we stated we were "ornithologists" we needed to show a letter of affiliation with a research institute or nature association, as they were not "policy-wise" allowed to book tourists to DVFC (see below). It took some minor hassle to get this letter, but when done we were accepted as Naturalist visitors and booked in a twin room with an extra bed at the Resthouse. Another option is to stay at the Hostel (long way to walk to the dining hall next to the Resthouse), or camp (there is a simple shelter with mosquito nets at the start of East trail). When at DVFC we were a bit surprised with the number of "regular" tourists. We asked a few of them how they got there and they had just made contact with DVFC and stated that they would like to visit. So our suggestion would be NOT to state that you are a birder/naturalist/ornithologist to avoid the hassle of showing the affiliation. We paid 3625 RM / 3p at the Lahad Datu office (excluding transport). We prebooked transport via Richel, a private 4WD at the cost of 350 RM single way. There are cheaper buses but they don't leave every day and only on fixed times. When we got to DVFC we checked in at the head office and were shown a long list of do's and don't's. *E.g.* the only trail that is allowed to walk on your own is Nature Trail, on all other trails you need to hire a guide. However this is not implemented strictly. The best advise is just DON'T ask. The staff at DVFC seem to have a relaxed approach to obvious birders and no one bothered us with questions.

<u>Strategy</u>: First of all you need to decide if you would like to go to BRL or DVFC. There seem to be some birds easier at BRL than DVFC (Black-throated Wren-Babbler, Blue-banded Pitta). If possible it would be advisable to stay at both places since there seem to be some differences. How many nights should you stay? Well, as many as possible. Which trails are good? All trails are good, the birds are constantly moving. A week prior to our trip I had a long talk with two birding friends in Sweden who just had returned from a long Malaysia birding trip. They had been something like 8-10 days at DVFC and they pin-pointed many of their good sightings (including Giant Pitta during a night-walk!!, Fairy Pitta, Bornean Ground Cuckoo, Black-throated Wren-Babbler and many more),

although very recent sightings we could not relocate one single bird. And when comparing to other trip reports it's also clear that there is no coherence whatsoever. So our advise is just to be out there, preferably around the clock, day and night, on the trails, intensely scanning. Nightwalking can be especially rewarding, we found Hooded Pitta, Black-crowned Pitta and Chestnut-necklaced Partridge during our walks (we never saw any of these birds during day-time at DVFC), and as shy these birds are during daylight as unconcerned they were during the night. One could easily stand just a few meters from them without them seeming disturbed, amazing! During our time we had time to explore most of the trailsystem around DVFC. We never walked Elephant ridge or the northernmost parts of the Grid, these trails are apparantly, at least to some extent, overgrown. Rhino ridge was a strenuous hike, after Rhino pool the trail gradually climbes along the ridge, and it eventually becomes really steep. After reaching the highest point it goes downhill northward and at some points it was sparsely marked. If you have the guts (I barely had...), do climb the small tree platform on the Nature trail, we had a marvellous morning there, highlighted by a pack of Bristlehead surrounding us at eye-level in the canopy. The entrance road is probably whort spending more time on, during one evening there we had a big flock of Large Green Pigeons, a pair of Falconets and several other good stuff.




Danum Valley Conservation Area. It's a two hour drive from Lahad Datu to Danum Valley on gravel roads cutting right through fantastic forests. Together with Taman Negara in Peninsular Malaysia probably the key site for Greater Sunda lowland rainforest species. For a detailed map of the trail system in DVFC see Poulsen 2012.

Kinabalu Park

Home to a majority of Bornean endemics and the natural key-site for all birders going to Sabah. The slopes of Mt Kinabalu is covered with pristine rainforest, while the highest parts are barren. Its an extremely popular tourist destination, and the main reason to come is usually to climb the highest peak. From a birding perspective you're better to avoid the overcrowded summit trail apart for an early morning hike up to Layang-Layang for Friendly Bush-warbler (heard only), Flavescent (Pale-faced) Bulbul and Mountain Blackeye. The star birds are however found on the lower slopes. Especially Silau-Silau Trail is famous for the Whitehead's Trogon and Broadbill being regularly seen there. Birding was often slow and quiet. April seemed to be main breeding season, and we found many birds on nest and few recently fledged juveniles. The weather was mostly perfect, one torrential shower for an hour one afternoon otherwise clear, not too windy, not too hot, not too misty. For the second year running there were a group of American students working on different bird surveys including breeding ecology and

banding. Every day we saw multiple birds carrying different color combinations of rings. Accommodation: Early on we decided to stay outside the park, we chose Mile36 Lodge (mile36lodge.com) and booked on Agoda.com which worked out fine. It took some negotiation to make the staff provide packed breakfast to us (egg and fabric toast), finally they agreed to prepare it the night before and deliver it to our room in the evening. On our first morning we had to wait until breakfast was served before going into the park (on all other mornings we had packed breakfast), and while waiting outside the lodge we soon found among the first endemics a pair of Pygmy White-eyes carrying nesting material! And on our final morning we had a Dark Hawk-Cuckoo calling just below the lodge. We paid around 175 RM per night (3p) for a spatious family room. This is far cheaper than most accommodation within the park and thus almost covers the costs for a rental car. Strategy: We walked and walked and walked. At long times it was slow but in the end we got to see a decent share of the good birds. We had three full days plus an extra halfday that was spoiled due to the car break-in. We never had time to walk the long Liwagu Trail. We spent three dead-early mornings on Bukit Ular for the Everett's Thrush, but it just wasn't around. On the other hand we had great views of Crimson-headed Partridge and Orange-headed Thrush (even rarer than Everett's?), on our last morning we finally had a calling Whitehead's Broadbill, but it was unreachable. Fruithunter was eventually found the last afternoon on Mempening, a quiet pair above the trail. On the first day we parked the car at Timpohon Gate and slowly walked trails down to HQ for lunch, then up Silau-Silau and back to HQ before taking a cab up to Timpohon to collect the car. There are very few stakeouts, Whitehead's Trogon at the upper Silau-Silau still seems reliable, we had one female on one of three attempts. The birdiest trail was perhaps Pandanus, a short partly steep trail running besides a small stream. After three full days it felt hard to add anything new, although another day or two would have been good. We chose to avoid Summit Trail on a weekend which probably was a wise move. Timpohon Gate opens at 07.00 and you can buy your daypass to Layang-Layang there. There is a small shop at the gate where they sell some candy, drinks, coffee, fried bananas and good-enough lunchboxes. On two days we had lunch at Liwagu Restaurant which was a nice break.



Kinabalu Park. On the southern slopes of Mt Kinabalu, the highest peak in South-east Asia. There is an extensive system of well-marked, mostly deserted and easily walked trails between the park HQ and Timpohon Gate. Here are some of the main trails, for details see Poulsen 2012. Blue: main road. Pink: Bukit Ular. Yellow: Mempening. Red: Silau-Silau. Green: Kiau View. Orange: Pandanus. Turqouise: Liwagu (which we never walked).

Poring Hot Springs


The lower eastern slopes of Kinabalu at Poring Hot Springs holds a bit different set of birds. It can be done as a day excursion from Kinabalu park as it only take around 40-45 minutes to drive there. All birding is done from one single track, the Langanan Waterfall trail. It's popular tourist destination and should probably best be avoided at weekends. We only met two small groups of tourists on the trail though. The area is gated, however it's possible to enter even if you arrive very early in the morning, well before daylight (as we did), as long as the guard is awake! We simply drove up to the gate and waved at the guard, showed our bins and told him we were birders, then he let us in. We bought the entrance ticket when we left in the evening (which took a bit of explanation). Many reports mentions generally slow birding and there are a few really good birds that are more or less difficult to catch up with: Hose's Broadbill, Blue-banded and Bornean Banded Pitta and White-necked Babbler. Strategy: It's important to start early! We reached the bamboo areas past the bat cave (after crossing two streams) early in the morning and guite soon had a Blue-banded Pitta calling just next to the track and after some patience got great views, at that point we thought that had saved the day already. This is also the spot for Whitenecked Babbler however we didn't see any. The trail continues slightly uphill and eventually reaches a small stream that it follows up to the waterfall. The waterfall itself actually was more impressive than expected. After heavy showers the day before the stream was slightly flooded and created quite some noise disturbing birding. We did catch up with a small group of Crested Jays, and closer to the waterfalls both White-crowned Forktail and an unusually low altitude Bornean Whistling-Thrush. On the way back we had a pair of scarce Cinnamon-rumped Trogons. We had a few hours rest close to the bamboos mid-day when activity was painfully low. Early afternoon still quiet we decided to walk back up a bit before heading to HQ. This turned out to be a wise move since, how incredible it might sound, we actually found a Hose's Broadbill, a female, a bit distant, when it finally took off another bird joined her, probably her mate, but we could not confirm that. Later on we also added Orangebreasted Trogon and Red-beared Bee-eater to the day-list. A heavy but short shower later on got activity started again and we had a pair of White-tailed Flycatchers before we reached the HQ. Chestnut-capped Thrush should be searched for on the lower slopes closer to the bat cave, here also Gould's Frogmouth during night (we tried without success). Bornean Banded Pitta should be looked for especially above the bamboo-areas when reaching an area with enormously large trees. It was quite exhausting to start that early at Kinabalu to be able to reach Poring well before dawn, it might be advisable to stay at PHS HQ instead, and probably not only one night, but two.

Poring Hot Springs. The best birding is following the 3,5 KM Langanan Waterfall Trail, we started early, around 05.00 and reached the bat cave (obvious not at least by the foul smell) 30-40 minutes later while still dark. In late afternoon while back at HQ we looked for Scaly-breasted Bulbul around the soccer field without success.

Rafflesia Information Center, Gunung Alab

South of Kinabalu the mighty Crocker Range stretches down to Sarawak. Most tours include a half-day at the Rafflesia Information Center close to Gunung Alab. There is a good number of birds difficult to catch up with at Kinabalu or Poring including a few endemic such as Whitehead's Spiderhunter, Bornean Leafbird, Barbet and Bulbul, and Mountain Barbet, all of whom we got.

Accommodation: Tambunan Inn, which was ok but nothing more, around 140 RM/3p booked via Agoda.com. We had dinner at a local restaurant close to the hotel. It took 25 minutes to drive from Tambunan Inn to RIC. <u>Strategy</u>: Most birders start early from KK, spend the morning around RIC and then continiues to Kinabalu. We had planned for one afternoon and one morning birding, however we had to cancel the last day due to the car break-in at Kinabalu. Luckily we had good views of almost all our targets on the first afternoon, however we did miss Cinereous Bulbul and Mountain Serpent Eagle that we might have gotten the last day if offered more time. The center doesn't open until 08 or 09 (can't remember unfortunately) and it closes at 17.00. Almost all good birds were seen within the grounds of the center, which basically is the only place where you get away from the road (which we found not that deserted as other reports state, there were quite a lot of traffic, also early in the morning). Birding along the main road didn't felt as exciting as the RIC grounds. 800 m before RIC (when coming from Tambunan) there is a large gated clearing on the right hand side (north side) of the road. There is some sort of deserted hotel project here, and the grounds looked interesting and you're away from the disturbing road. If you're not too afraid, it might be worth trying to jump the fence (it's difficult to see why anyone should bother).
