Russia's Ring of Fire

Booked through Birdquest and operated by Heritage Expeditions. Our vessel is the Professor Khromov aka Spirit of Enderby.

Russian Far East! This is undoubtedly one of the most spectacular and dramatic parts on our planet. The landscape is the result from the Pacific plate subducting under the North American Plate, creating volcanic and geothermal activity.

The deep trenches, often not far from the coastline, secures perfect conditions for seabirds and cetaceans. We have the chance for some 14 species of Auks, the incredible Steller's Sea Eagle and plenty of other, very range-limited birds.



Roger in Moscow

We start our trip by me getting up to Arlanda on 25 May, meeting up with

Roger for our first, short, leg. A Flight to Moscow and a night at an airport hotel. Some adventurous sightseeing in Moscow centre, including taking our chances in the Moscow Metro.



And then on with excellent Aeroflot to Petropavlovsk, Kamchatka, where our expedition starts. The flight is just under eight hours, and the time difference is nine hours, so we land earlier than we start. Very time efficient!

27/5 Petropavlovsk area and disembark

We spend one day in and around Petropavlovsk with some coastal birding. We had some Harlequin Ducks, Blackbacked Wagtail (M.a.lugens) and Common Tern of the ssp longipennis. Slaty-backed Gull is the only Gull in the harbor and a bit outside the coastline we have our first auks. Some Pigeon Guillemots and Ancient Murrelets. A short walk in the Taiga is dominated by Olive-backed Pipit and Rustic Bunting.

Boarding time is 15:30 but we are not allowed to leave harbour until four hours after scheduled departure, due to administrative struggle.



Our ship MV Professor Khromov/ Spirit of Enderby We install ourselves in our cabin (we share a three-bed cabin, so we have enough space) and head for deck.

Before sun set, we get our first Tufted Puffin.

28/5 Sailing to Commander Islands

Open sea on our way to the largest of the two Commander Islands, Bering Island.

Bering named both the Commander Islands, and the largest of the Islands. Vitus Bering, Danish explorer, discovered the islands on his expedition, sailing between Asia and North America.

During the day, we have some auks
including Horned and Tufted Puffins, some
Laysan Albatross and Fork-tailed Storm
Petrel, but the highlights are the whale
observations. 4 Blue Whales, 1 Sperm
Whale and 4 Fin Whales.

9/5 Bering Island



Nikol'skoye, Bering island, Commander Islands
Sailing slowly alongside Bering Island, we anchor at Nikolskoye, using zodiacs. The village holds a museum. In the museum is a complete skeleton of a Steller's Sea Cow, a species that was hunted to extinction in just a time period of some forty years after the discovery by the botanist Steller, participating on the Bering expedition.
This is the downside of the exploration of new territory!

Some rain and wind makes it a bit difficult
but we start at the shore line and we get
some Grey-tailed Tattler, Dunlin and
Mongolian (Lesser Sand) Plover. It doesn't
take long before we have a group of Rock
Sandpiper. Very good views of this superb
bird!

But, we need to focus on yet another pearl, the Pechora Pipit. So we head out on the grassy areas outside the village, and we don't need to struggle for very long before we see two individuals. Very distinctive and easy to identify even though they are

mostly silent. In the bay we get a rather rare view of a Grey Whale.

Also the first encounter with the Redlegged Kittiwake on the Arij Karmen Islet. Apart from this, all is cold and wet! Sailing towards Medney, the second of the Commander Islands.

30/5 Medney Island, sailing back to Kamchatka

is around +5 and whether or not we freeze

After this, we do a Zodiac Cruise among thousands of auks and we get good photo opportunities of several species.

This is it, as far as the Commanders are concerned. Now we head back to Kamchatka and our destination is Zhupanova River.





The mouth of Zhupanova river, Kamchatka Arriving at Zhupanova River at noon, we spend the rest of the day in Zodiacs.

The gem is Steller's Sea Eagle and we pass
three nests with birds in them. The nests
are really impressive and the birds tend to
disappear inside as we approach them.
Nevertheless we had fine views of seven
birds.

Aleutian Tern, Zhupanova river, Kamchatka Going in, we are extremely fortunate, as 14 Aleutian Tern rest on a mudflat. On our return three hours later, they are all gone! A very good day to be followed by a tasty dinner, as proves to be the case during the whole trip!

Before we leave our vessel, we see 2
Kittlitz's Murrelet, a very good one to be able to add to our list.

Bears are quite common here, but we are not fortunate (?) enough to see any. Bird wise it is pleasant, with species like Brown-headed Thrush and Japanese Grey Bunting.

After this, we do a Zodiac cruise outside the Fjord, searching for Orcas. None of them are around, but we have 4 Steller's Sea Eagle and a good variety of Auks. Good photo opportunities especially of the Tufted Puffin.

The Kuril Islands

In the middle of nowhere, it feels, and yet of significant geopolitical value. As it is right now, the Japanese claim the right to the two southernmost islands, but all the islands are currently under Russia. The indigenous people, Aino, have suffered badly and only a very small population still exist in Japan. On the Kurils themselves, there are no Ainos anymore. They were all deported to Russia and Japan. The remainder in Japan is estimated to around 200 persons.

2/6 Atlasova and Onekotan Islands. Cyclone!

At 05:30 we anchor off Atlasova and we go ashore there. Atlasova, with the highest volcano of the Kurils, 2340 meters above sea level.

After the walk we head for Onekotan. During this stretch, we have good views of Orcas, lots and lots of Fulmars and good numbers of Tufted puffins.

Wind increases and it is impossible to land, so we just cruise to and fro. At 8 PM the wind is at 90 knots (46 m/s). IT makes you feel very, very small! Still, some good birds are seen, such as Leach's Stormpetrels and Short-tailed Albatross. During the night the ship took shelter behind Onekotan island as indicated on the map.

Today it is not possible to get into Zodiacs, so we just cruise. In the afternoon, we try chumming and the result is good.

Thousands of Fulmars dominate, and 10-12 Laysans follow us. We count 6 different Short-tailed -and one Black-footed Albatross. Not exactly following us, but showing some interest at a distance.

Simuchir. The swelling is tough and our
first attempt to get into the Zodiacs is
aborted. A second attempt is successful
and roughly half the group takes the
opportunity to talk a walk on the island.
Black-headed Bunting is singing and some
eight individuals are noted.

After this somewhat wet experience (for those who participated), we sail back north to Yankicha with the hope to be able to reach into a caldera where extreme numbers of Crested- and Whiskered Auklet are suppose to breed. The description of how amazing this location is, make our expectation high!

At 6PM,we are on our way in and already outside the Caldera, we see hundreds of thousands of Auklets!! In the beginning mostly Whiskered but as we approach the Caldera, Crested takes over the show. And what a show!! Literally millions of birds fly in, to either sit on the water or fly to the cliffs. This is undoubtedly one of the most spectacular moments that a birder can hope for on planet Earth.

In the morning we are sailing off Chirpoy, we anchor and go for a Zodiac cruise along its coastline. The volcano is active and smoke is coming up everywhere. Now and then rocks tumble into the sea. It is surreal and once again you feel rather small and insignificant watching nature totally untamed.

The very light subspec of White-tailed Sea-eagle After this, we sail to Urup Island. Four hours later, we land on a nice beach and take a walk a little bit inland.

It is very green here, in a way that we haven't seen so far. Japanese Bush-warbler is fairly common as is the Japanese Robin. The latter proves totally unwilling to show itself and after well over an hour focusing on getting one of all the singing ones to come out in the open, we have to give up for the day.

Other birds here are Long-tailed Rosefinch, Black-faced Bunting, Middendorff's
Grasshopper Warbler and Oriental Cuckoo.
We also have our first Large-billed Crow.

At 9 PM, we sail further south for Iturup Island, where we expect to land sometime in the morning.



We approach Iturup. Plan for today is a truck drive up the mountains to get a bit of a feeling of how it looks when we are not in the coastal region. Due to the wind coming from the west, we want to land at another place than originally planned and this means getting clearance from the Coastguards and getting the truck drivers to move the vehicles.



As we probably are the only ship coming here with foreigners, we must expect that the procedures before we are free to drive, will take its time.

Well, no big problems and we are on our way relatively quickly. We head inland and up to volcano area. On Iturup there are three settlements. The largest one, Kurilsk, holds about 7000 inhabitants.

The landscape is fascinating, with high, snowy volcano peaks as well as deep, green valleys. Birdwise not so successful. The Robin wouldn't show itself and neither did the Japanese Accentor. We heard them sing but didn't get them out. Latham's Snipe was in a good spirit and several showed us his display flight.



On the way back, we get some Pacific Swifts along with some House Martinssometimes split into Asian House Martin, Delichon dasypus. Also the Buzzard that we see soaring is according to some a good species, Eastern Buzzard, B.japonicus. Back on the vessel at around 3 PM and we now sail towards Kunashir, the southernmost of the Kuril Islands.

7/6 Kunashir Island

When opening our eyes off Kunashir, we can only smile! No wind, no clouds and the most magnificent volcano! We enter our Zodiacs at 5:45 and are met by rangers.

Our ranger in front of the researcher's cottage We will go birding in a nature reserve and we are not allowed to go without a ranger. Our rangers are carrying rifles, since Kunashir holds a very high density of Brown Bears.

We have some 4.5 hours and head for a
forested area, ending our trail at a riverside
and go back the same trail.

It is a fairly old forest with understory and looks very promising. Very good birding with a fantastic male Narcissus Flycatcher, Crested Kingfisher and Japanese Pygmy Flycatcher.



At last, the black thing is the back of a Brown Bear But above all, a bear. At a distance, feeding among the green understory. When sailing, we are accompanied by a dozen Pacific Loon, and hundreds of Rhinoceros Auklet spread all over the water surface.

evening we all do a recap of this amazing and unique trip.

When anchored at Korsakov, we can add some Black-tailed Gulls to our list and our very last new species is an Eastern Great Tit in the park just adjacent to Mega Palace Hotel in Yuzhno-Sakhalinsk. Roger and myself now travel to Moscow where we spend the night, and then directly home in the morning. Now, the work on editing pictures will start......

Summary

This really is THE trip to make if you want to experience how nature really is, when unspoiled by man. Of course, hunters up at the Commander Islands did slaughter a substantial part of the Sea Otters, and put the Steller's Sea Cow to extinction. But with the Auk blast in Yankicha in mind (forever) this remote area is still the proof of what nature once looked like.




